Quest. 12. *Who have died this year?*

1. BENJAMIN LAKIN was a native of Maryland. His parents removed into Pennsylvania when he was quite small, and from thence into Kentucky, in the early settlement of that region. He had very limited opportunities of religious instruction at that dark period in the West. Very few around him professed to know anything of justification by faith; and the practice of the people was as defective as their experience. In these circumstances, the gospel of Christ, as light in a dark place, shone into his heart, through the instrumentality of the Methodist ministers. He saw himself a great sinner, and felt most exquisitely his need of a Saviour. He sought pardon with great earnestness, and in the exercise of simple faith he soon obtained peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. He united with the then persecuted Methodists, and being moved by the Holy Ghost, and approved by the Church, he entered the great work of the Christian ministry.

From his own record, it appears he commenced his labors as a traveling preacher, Nov. 6, 1794. The following spring he was admitted by the conference, and appointed in charge of Greene circuit. In 1796 he was appointed alone on Danville. In 1797 he was admitted into full connection, and appointed alone to Lexington circuit. During this year he married an excellent wife, and located the next conference. After three years, he was re-admitted and filled the following appointments: In 1801, Limestone; 1802, Sciota and Miami; 1803, Salt River; 1804, Danville; 1805, Salt River and Shelby; 1806 and 1807, Miami; 1808, Deer Creek; 1809 and 1810, Hockhocking; 1811, Cincinnati; 1812, White Oak; 1813, Union; 1814, Limestone; 1815, Lexington; 1816 and 1817, Hinkstone. In 1818 he was returned to Hinkstone in the relation of supernumerary. In 1819 his health had so failed that he was wholly unable to perform the work of an effective traveling preacher, and he was placed on the superannuated list. This relation he sustained until he was removed from labor and suffering to his reward in heaven. For many years it has been his custom to have an appointment to preach every Sabbath, unless a quarterly or some other special meeting interfered, and at such meetings he helped us much in the Lord. Perhaps there never was a superannuated minister who labored so much, or was more useful. He had three appointments out at the time of his death. Concerning one of them he said to a friend, "If I live I will fill it; and, if I die, it will have to fall through." He preached his last sermon at M'Kendree chapel, on the 28th of January last. On the following Tuesday he returned to his home at Point Pleasant; Wednesday and Thursday he complained of some indisposition. On Friday morning, being quite relieved, he started on horseback, his uniform mode of traveling, for our quarterly meeting at Felicity. After riding six miles, he reached the house of Sister Richards, in his usual health of body, and cheerful and happy frame of mind. About 12 o'clock that night, he was attacked with a chill and nausea. On Saturday and Sabbath he continued quite unwell; on Monday he was much better, and after eating his supper in the evening, he sat some time by the fire, and conversed sweetly with the family. At about 7 o'clock he arose, looked at his watch, and walked out of the room toward the front door. A noise being heard in the entry, the family followed, and found he had fallen to the floor; the first supposition was that he had fainted, and they made an effort to revive him; but it was the paralyzing touch of death, and his spirit had fled.

Thus died the venerable and beloved Lakin, in the eighty-second year of his age, and fifty-fourth of his ministry.

"His body and his charge laid down,  
 He ceased at once to work and live."

2. **NATHAN EMERY** was born Aug. 5, 1780, in the town of Minot, Cumberland co., in the State of Maine. He had a pious mother, and her faithful instructions made a lasting impression upon his youthful heart. In the latter part of 1794, a Methodist minister was sent into that region of country; his father's house became a preaching-place, and during the next summer, he, with several other members of the family, became the subject of converting grace. About a year after this, though only sixteen years of age, he was appointed the leader of a class; and in this capacity he served the Church until called to a more extensive field of usefulness.

Early in the year 1799 he was licensed to preach, and employed on a circuit by the presiding elder until the succeeding conference, where he was received on trial into the traveling connection. He was admitted into full connection, and ordained deacon, in 1801; and in 1803, at a conference held in the city of Boston, he was ordained an elder. After traveling seven years, he was married to Miss Clarissa Frothingham, in Middletown, Conn., May 20, 1806. This was a happy marriage. Through all the toils and discouragements of life, he ever found her "a help meet for him." For nearly forty years they journeyed on together in the pilgrimage of life, when she preceded him a little to the land of rest.

For over 20 years from the time he entered the itinerant work, he labored efficiently and acceptably in some of the most important fields of the New-England Conference. But in 1821, in consequence of feeble health, he took a superannuated relation; and removing to Ohio, settled in the town of Worthington. The next year, his health being somewhat improved, and being unwilling to burden his brethren, he asked and obtained a location.

In 1828 he was employed by the presiding elder to travel Columbus circuit, and the next year was re-admitted into the traveling connection. He continued to labor in some of the most difficult and important appointments of the Ohio Conference, until 1838, when he again received a superannuated relation. In this relation he continued laboring according to his ability, until he was taken from the Church militant to the Church triumphant.

For some time before his death, he had been in feeble and declining health. Still he continued his ordinary labors, both in the field and in the pulpit, until very near the close of life. He preached on Sabbath, May 20th, and gave out an appointment for the succeeding Sabbath. On Tuesday he was attacked very violently with inflammation of the bowels, from which he suffered much, and at times suffered extremely. But "he endured as seeing Him who is invisible." And on Sabbath, May 27, 1849, he "entered into his rest," at a quarter past ten o'clock in the morning.

Father Emery, as he was familiarly and affectionately called, was no ordinary man. His preaching talents were not showy, but, far better than showy, they were useful. His ministrations were practical, and always characterized by good sense, great zeal for God, and a deep concern for the salvation of souls. Of a sweet and amiable spirit, he was greatly beloved of men—of deep and uniform piety, he was greatly honored of God.

He had always looked with some degree of dread to the conflict with his last enemy. And as he saw the hour of his dissolution at hand, he besought the Lord earnestly for dying grace. And dying grace was given. He took an affectionate leave of his friends, and especially his daughter, an only child, to whom he spoke many precious words of consolation. As he approached the Jordan of death, his soul became more and more enraptured with the visions of glory that were revealed to him upon the other shore. And while passing through its chilling waters, he said, "O how gently my Saviour leads me through." Just as the spirit was about to take its flight, he looked upward, and fixing his eyes, as if upon some object of unutterable loveliness, in a low whisper he exclaimed, "Up! up! up!" These were his last words on earth.

3. **ASA B. STROUD** was born April 11, 1807. He was born again at a camp-meeting near Petersburg, Va., in 1823, and joined the M. E. Church. The evidence of his acceptance with God through Jesus Christ was so clear and satisfactory, as to free him from all doubts and fears.

He came to Cincinnati in 1826, and united with the Church of his choice. His life was such as to commend religion, for he adorned his profession. May 20, 1830, he married Mary E. Jourden, in whom he found a help-meet—they were of one mind as to God's service. In the fall of 1830 he was received on trial into the traveling con-

nection, and appointed to Kanawha circuit, where he spent one year, giving full proof that he was called of God, as was Aaron. The two following years he traveled Letart Falls circuit; the year after, Charleston circuit; then Parkersburg and Athens circuits, each one year; New-Haven, two years; Eaton and Franklin, 2 years each; Monroe, one year; Urbana station, one year; South Charleston, one year; Reply station, 2 years; Cincinnati miss., one year; and Milford circuit, one year: this was his last appointment.

Brother Stroud was a faithful preacher, doing always good service wherever appointed to labor. Many in the day of eternity will call him blessed. During his last year's service to the Church, the cholera prevailed in the village where he lived, and in the vicinity. Like a faithful shepherd he stayed with the fold, and by day and by night, to the utmost of his ability, ministered to the afflicted and dying. Long will he live in the memory of some who survive him, because of his fidelity in the hour of adversity. Early in September he was attacked with flux—from this he was relieved by his medical attendants; but while very feeble, erysipelas attacked his head, and at the same time he complained of some new, yet painful affection of his lungs; so prostrated by his first attack, he was unable to resist the power of disease, and yielded up his spirit, Sept. 23, 1849.

During his illness he often said, I feel that good is the will of the Lord concerning me. He felt some solicitude for his wife and six children; but, looking his wife in the face, he said, (alluding to their situation,) "The Lord will provide." Br. Stroud's piety was uniform; his life a useful one, his end peaceful; leaving to his bereaved family a fair reputation, connected with the assurance that he has gone to share the rewards of God's ministers in that brighter, better, happier world above. "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord."

4. **MARTIN WOLF** was born in Washington, Pa., Nov. 25, 1813. His parents were of German descent, and in their religious views opposed to Methodism.

When about fourteen years of age, Br. Wolf attended a Methodist camp-meeting, where he was convicted of sin, sought and found redemption in the blood of the Lamb, even the forgiveness of sin, and united with the M. E. Church, which brought upon him the displeasure of his parents, so that he was compelled to leave home or sacrifice a good conscience—he chose the former, and God sustained him, and gave him friends and a home in the Church, where he served the Lord.

In the spring of 1835 he came to Ohio, and settled in Dayton, where he wrought at his trade. Perhaps the first Sabbath he spent in Dayton, he attended a quarterly meeting, and in love-feast gave an account of his conversion, which kindled a flame of love and gratitude in the congregation—at the same time he gave in his certificate. This same year he was licensed to exhort; the year following to preach, and was also recommended to the Ohio Annual Conference, and was received into the traveling connection on trial by that body.

He traveled successively the following circuits, viz.: Greenville, New-Haven, Newark, Belpre, Charleston, Va., Miami, Wilmington, Worthington, Loudon, two years; South Charleston, two years; and North Bend, where he finished his course in peace, on the 10th day of July, 1849.

He preached two sermons on the Sabbath before his death, to weeping congregations. His last text was Ruth i, 16, 17. He was then in his usual health. At 5 o'clock on Monday morning he was attacked by cholera so violently, that it defied the power of medicine; and in twenty-three short hours he closed his eyes in death. His sufferings were so great, that he could say but little about his state of mind. He prayed for dying grace, and the Lord gave it, so that he was able to say, "O what a feast of love!" and "Jesus shows his mercies mine, and whispers I am his."

Brother Wolf was a useful preacher, of medium talents, which he constantly studied to improve. He was a good man, full of faith and the Holy Ghost, and a good minister of the gospel, and was beloved for his work's sake wherever he went. He was a good and faithful pastor, and was growing in grace, knowledge, and usefulness, having been instrumental (with his colleague) in a glorious revival of religion, which was in progress when he fell at his post doing the work of an evangelist.

5. **ALEXANDER MORROW** was born in Northumberland county, Penn., March 21, 1800, and was dedicated to God by baptism in the Protestant Episcopal Church. There was little preaching in that portion of the State, until the Methodist ministers came and proclaimed a free and full salvation to the people. Under the ministry of Rev. John

Hazzard, his mother and eldest brother became members of the Church, and Alexander was deeply impressed with the necessity of religion. His convictions, however, at that time, did not eventuate in conversion. In the fall of 1818 he removed to Ohio, and settled in Ross county, and in the following year he was married to Miss Frances Harper, who entered into her rest some eighteen months before him. In the spring of 1821 they removed to Crawford county, in the north part of the State. Five years afterward, he invited Rev. Arza Brown to preach at his house. Br. Brown embraced it as a regular preaching-place on Sandusky circuit. On the 7th of January, 1827, he remained in class for the first time, deeply penitent; the day following, he and his wife and six others united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in his own house. He soon became convinced of the necessity of a deeper work of grace, and in earnest prayer, and by simple faith in Christ, he realized the second great blessing, "perfect love." From this time he lived a witness of entire sanctification. When convinced that it was his duty to preach Christ crucified, "the way, the truth, and the life," and call sinners to repentance, he entered upon the holy vocation with firmness and ardor. After serving the Church in the relation of exhorter and local preacher for some time, in 1833 he was admitted into the itinerancy, and appointed to Worthington circuit. He labored more than fifteen years in the work of a traveling preacher, with great fidelity, acceptance, and usefulness, and "then fell at his post."

There are many in the various fields of labor where he served the Church, who will long cherish in fond remembrance his great worth of character, his deep and uniform piety, his agreeable manners and sweet spirit. His example was a good model for the ministry and membership of the Church. Br. Morrow was an excellent preacher. He was esteemed by many as a theologian of a high order. Truly may we say of him, "He was a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and of faith."

His last circuit was East White Oak. At the beginning of his quarterly meeting at Georgetown, on the 27th of January, he appeared to be in good health. The meeting was protracted, and he labored day and night with much zeal and power; his efforts in the pulpit and prayer-meetings were crowned with great success. On the second Sabbath of this meeting, he preached his last sermon. After service he retired to his room, and went out no more. His disease was soon ascertained to be a violent attack of typhoid fever; and after six days, it was apparent he must soon die, and his only child was sent for.

He furnished every assurance that he was "ready to be offered up," and on the 13th of February he triumphantly entered into glory.

About two hours before he died, he said it was getting dark; conscious that his sight was about to be lost in death, he added, "I shall walk through the valley of the shadow of death, and fear no evil." "Bless the Lord, O my soul!" He then embraced his weeping daughter, and commended her to God; and, when unable to speak, he raised his palsied hands, and clapped them in token of victory. O may we all thus die!

6. ALFRED L. WESTERVELT died of cholera, July 31st, in the 29th year of his age. Being the son of pious parents, he had a religious education; yet he did not give himself up unreservedly to God, and connect himself with the Church, till the day he was 19 years old. Having embraced religion, and joined the Church, he soon felt himself called of God to enter into the work of a Christian minister. The Church being satisfied that he was thus called, gave him license. He officiated in the capacity of a local preacher, and when the time came to renew his license, it was renewed, and he recommended to the Ohio Annual Conference, to be admitted on trial in the traveling connection. He was admitted, and appointed to Jackson circuit; the second year, to Waverley; the third year, to French Grant; the fourth year, to Patriot; the fifth and sixth years, to Burlington; there he finished his work, having been six years in the itinerancy; the first three years in the relation of a junior, and the other three that of a preacher in charge; those relations he sustained, and performed his work to the satisfaction of the Church: this was awarded to him by his colleagues and presiding elders. He was a man of deep piety, and respectable talents. His theme was holiness—he enjoyed the blessing of perfect love. The day arrived on which he must die; at 10 o'clock in the morning in perfect health, and having spread out before him the prospect of a long and useful life, not knowing that his days were numbered, before the hour of 12, he felt some unwell; medical aid was sought, their skill applied, but all in vain; cholera had got fast hold, and by 3 o'clock, P. M., he was in a collapsed state, and fast sinking into the arms of death; his mind calm, his thoughts composed, fully

apprized that he had but a few hours to stay—spoke of his decease, said he was prepared—his prospect of heaven was bright, and he wished this told to the people of his charge; and after conversing with his wife, and giving some advice as to her future course, at half-past eight o'clock in the evening he quietly fell asleep in Jesus. "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord."
