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

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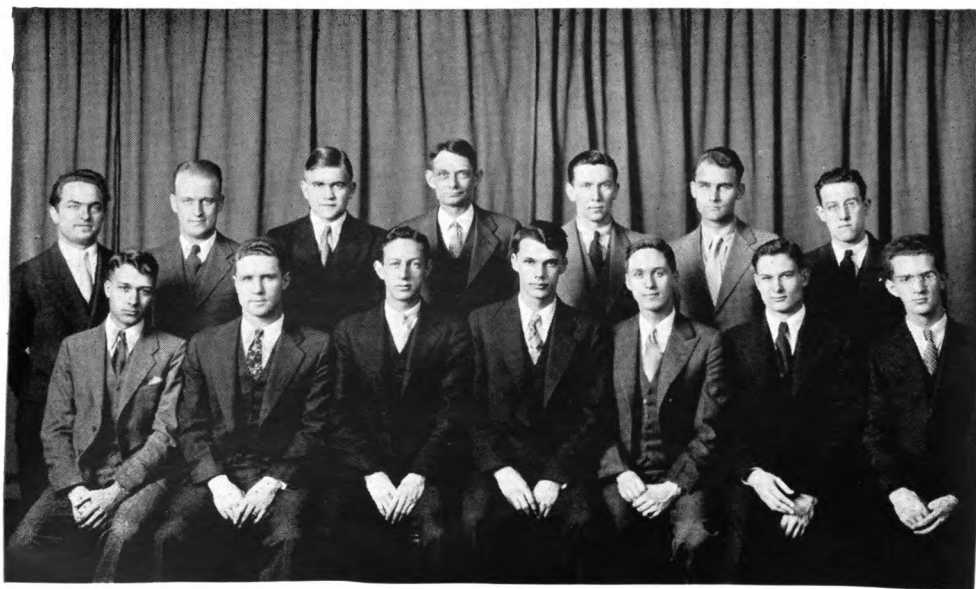
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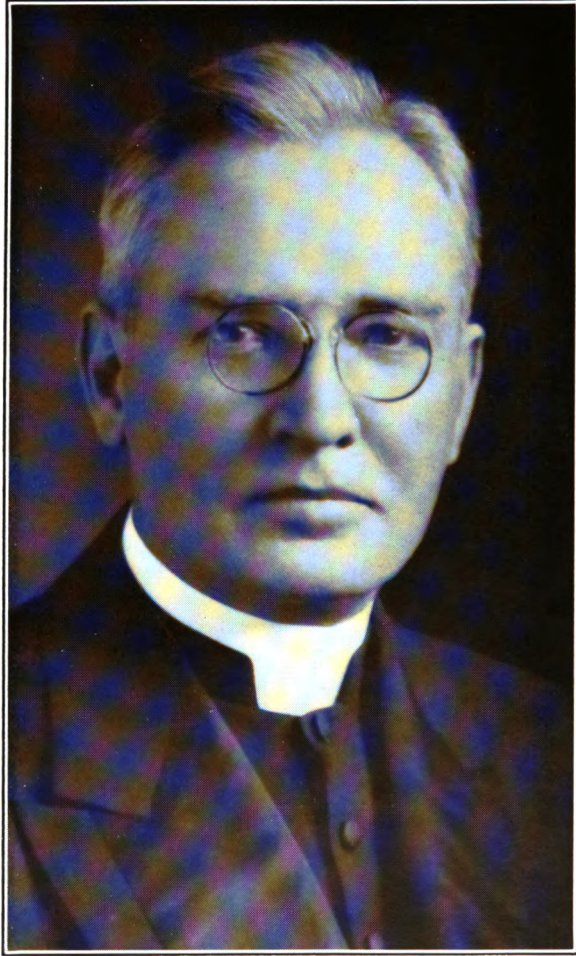

FIRST DAY

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, SEPTEMBER 19, 1934

Opening of Session. The Detroit Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church opened its seventy-ninth session in the Jefferson Avenue Church, Saginaw, Michigan, on Wednesday, September 19, 1934, at 2:00 P. M. with Bishop Adna Wright Leonard, D. D., Resident Bishop of the Pittsburgh Area, presiding.

The Hymn, No. 560, "And Are We Yet Alive?" was sung, after which the Conference repeated the Apostles' Creed.

Bishop Adna W. Leonard led in prayer.

The Ladies' Chorus of the entertaining church sang the anthem entitled "Inflamatus."

The Hymn No. 325, "Break Thou the Bread of Life," was sung.

Miss Harriet L. Watson of China, was introduced and spoke in the interests of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

Change in Committee. On motion of George Marsh, Howard Burden was substituted on the Committee on Nominations in the place of Harry Biddlecombe, deceased.

Standing Commission on Evangelism. On motion of H. G. Pearce, the Conference ordered the creation of a Standing Commission on Evangelism of seven, with the request that it be ready to report before the close of the present session.

Recess. After announcements the Conference took a Recess until eleven o'clock.

Session Resumed. E. M. Moore took the chair and called the Conference to order.

Corporate Session. It being eleven o'clock and the time for the Corporate Session, E. M. Moore called the Conference into Corporate Session, at which

time business relating to the Corporate Conference was transacted. W. E. Marvin presented the following report:

REPORT OF THE CORPORATE CONFERENCE

Report of the Board of Trustees of the Detroit Annual Conference, Inc., of the Methodist Episcopal Church to the annual meeting of the Conference held in Jefferson Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church, Saginaw, September 20, 1934.

Your trustees have held two meetings during the year. First, in Central Y. M. C. A., Detroit, May 20, 1934. Second, in Jefferson Avenue Church, September 19, 1934.

On May 20, a resolution was adopted giving the abandoned building of the Free Church Society in Superior Township, Washtenaw County, to the Lincoln Park Methodist Episcopal Church, the material to be used in the construction of the new building in Lincoln Park.

At the same meeting Edward Conklin, William Kims, and Wesley Penman were appointed to act as trustees of the Free Church Cemetery, with authority to take complete charge of all affairs connected with the cemetery on condition that the annual conference assume no obligations concerning the same.

By unanimous vote, George B. Marsh, James Chapman, and W. E. Marvin were nominated as trustees to be elected for three years, to succeed themselves.

On September 19, Recommendations were adopted.

We recommend to the annual conference that the Board of Trustees be authorized to sell and convey a lot formerly belonging to the Methodist Episcopal Church of China in St. Clair County, now unused. And that the proceeds be loaned to the Methodist Episcopal Church of St. Clair, and if not called for within five years as provided in the Discipline to be given to the St. Clair Church.

II

We recommend to the annual conference that your trustees be authorized to issue a quit claim deed for a church site formerly belonging to the Crane Church in Midland County, and now unoccupied.

III

We recommend that your Board of Trustees be authorized to sell and convey the property of Lapeer Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church in Flint, no longer needed or used.

IV

We recommend that your Board of Trustees be authorized to sell and convey the Osceola Church in Houghton County, the proceeds to be loaned to the Laurium Church for five years, and if not called for to be given to the Laurium Church.

V

We recommend that your Trustees be authorized to sell and convey the Diorite Church on Marquette District, the proceeds of sale to be loaned to the

Michigamme Institute for five years, and if not called for to be given to the institute.

VI

We recommend that your Trustees be authorized and empowered to ratify, and take whatever legal steps that may be necessary to complete the sale and conveyance of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Brimley on Marquette District; the sale having previously been made by Joseph Dutton, Superintendent of the district. The net proceeds of this sale to be divided equally between the Methodist Episcopal Church at Hulburt, and the Methodist Episcopal Church in Pickford. This money to be loaned for five years and if not called for to become the property of the Hulburt and Pickford Churches.

Corporate Session Closed. The Corporate Session was declared closed and Bishop Leonard took the chair.

Devotions. The Hymn No. 530, "O Thou in Whose Presence My Soul Takes Delight," was sung.

Conference Picture. On motion of H. G. Pearce, the Conference was ordered to assemble for a Conference Photograph, to be taken immediately at the close of the morning session.

Devotions. Bishop Leonard spoke on "The Hireling Shepherd." He read a portion of the Tenth chapter of the Gospel according to St. John. He spoke of the need of fidelity on the part of the Christian minister in pastoral and pulpit ministrations.

Prayer was offered by the Bishop.

The Hymn No. 677, "Saviour, Like a Shepherd Lead Us," was sung.

M. S. Rice closed the morning session with prayer.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Opening of Session. Under the leadership of David Shugg, the Hymn No. 135, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned," and the Hymn No. 134, "When Gathering Clouds Around I View," were sung.

The Conference recited, "The Collect."

Financial Secretary Announced. John W. Greenwood was appointed as Financial Secretary.

Question Thirty Called. Under call of Question Thirty, Ernest Knautz was transferred to the North East Ohio Conference.

Draft Announced. The Bishop announced the receipt of a Draft for \$10 from the Detroit and Minnesota Fund. It was ordered turned over to the Treasurer of the Board of Stewards.

General Conference Expense Fund. The Bishop called the attention of the Conference to the stringency existing in the General Conference Expense Fund.

Depository Named. On motion of H. A. Field, the Second National Bank of Saginaw was named as the Depository of Conference Funds.

Executive Session. On motion, the Conference went into Executive Session.

Reconsideration. On motion, the Conference voted a reconsideration of the number of members on the Commission on Evangelism.

Question Twenty-four (c) Called. Under call of Question Twenty-four (c) Hanford D. Wright was elected to Deacon's Orders under the Seminary Rule.

Question Twenty Called. Under call of Question Twenty (a) Howard F. Snell was elected to Full Membership and to Deacon's Orders.

Request of Committee on Nominations. On behalf of the Committee on Nominations, George Marsh, requested a conference with the Cabinet on certain Committee Nominations. It was so ordered.

Executive Session Closed. On motion, the Executive Session was closed.

Introduction. The Bishop introduced Mrs. Homer Stuntz and Mrs. Clyde B. Stuntz, the mother and wife respectively of Dr. Clyde B. Stuntz, who was introduced and who spoke in the interests of the Board of Foreign Missions.

Benediction. The Bishop pronounced the Benediction which brought the afternoon session to a close.

THURSDAY EVENING

Conference Memorial Service

The Conference Memorial Service was held at 7:45, H. W. Kuhlman presiding.

The Hymn No. 207, "The Church's One Foundation," was sung, after which the Conference remained standing while the roll of the deceased fellow workers was read by the Secretary of the Conference. J. W. Greenwood led in prayer.

The Ladies' Quartet of the entertaining church sang "Hark, Hark, My Soul," by Shelley.

The various members of the Committee on Memoirs paid brief tributes to the memory, life and ministry of the deceased ministers and widows, mention also being made of the splendid life and service of Alice B. Shirey and of Elmer Houser.

E. F. Dunlavy read from the Scripture, Heb. 11:1-10.

The memorial address, "Adventures," was delivered by Doctor Frederick Spence, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, Jackson. It was a masterful address on the spirit of adventure of the Saints of God, whose decease ends not the quest of their faith which they carry even beyond the great adventure of death.

The Hymn No. 415, "Faith of Our Fathers," was sung and the service was closed with the benediction by Charles H. Morgan.

THIRD DAY

FRIDAY MORNING, SEPTEMBER 21, 1934

The Conference read responsively The Ten Commandments with the Responses as recorded on page 520 of the Hymnal.

The Hymn No. 78, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty," was sung.

William Richards led in prayer.

Reading of Journal. The Journal of the morning and afternoon sessions of the Second Day was read, corrected, and approved.

Memorial Service. On motion of Hartley Cansfield, the record of the Memorial Service was made a part of the Journal.

Referred to Committee. On motion of Hartley Cansfield, the Committee on Memoirs was instructed to prepare memoirs of Dr. C. B. Spencer and of Dr. and Mrs. Joshua Stansfield and that these are to be published in the Minutes.

Paragraph 90, Discipline. The Bishop asked the questions required in paragraph 90 of the Discipline and received suitable answers.

Report of Sesqui-Centennial of Methodism. R. M. Atkins read the report of the Sesqui-Centennial of Methodism. Hartley Cansfield offered a paragraph in addition to the Report and by common consent it was incorporated in the Report. The Report was adopted. (See Report.)

Committee on Distribution of Sustentation Fund. E. M. Moore read the report of the Committee on the Distribution of the Sustentation Fund and it was adopted. (See Report.)

Resolution on Pro-Rating. E. M. Moore presented the following resolution on Pro-Rating:

“The men who serve a charge a fraction of the Conference year shall be held responsible for the pro-rating of the Ministerial Support for the fraction served and shall make a report covering the fractional year to the Board of Stewards.”

On motion it was adopted.

Change of Lecture Hour. On motion of Peter Stair the hour for the Third Sesqui-Centennial Lecture was changed from 4 o'clock to 4:30.

Introduction. Dr. John L. Seaton of Albion College, was introduced and spoke briefly.

Dr. Ralph Templin of India, was introduced and spoke on missionary motives.

Dunning Idle introduced Miss Mary McKee, an evangelist.

Question Forty-nine. Under call of Question Forty-nine, “Where shall the next Conference be held?” R. C. G. Williams invited the Conference to Madison Avenue Church of Bay City for its Eightieth Session. On motion, the invitation was accepted.

Resolution on the Financial and Statistical Year. Frank N. Miner offered a resolution concerning the financial and statistical year; the distribution of work of the Conference Statistician and Treasurer, the unifying of their reports and the printing of the same in the Conference Minutes.

On motion, these proposals were referred to the following Committee: E. M. Moore (Convenor), C. E. Doty, S. W. Robinson, C. G. Phillips, Fred Clifford, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Statistician, the Conference Auditor.

On motion, the report of this Committee was made the Order of Day for Monday morning at 9:30.

Committee Excused. On motion, the Committee on Conference Relations was permitted to retire to do its work.

Presentation. Bishop Leonard presented Mrs. Edgar Blake, wife of our Resident Bishop, to the Conference.

Report of Committee on the Minimum Salary Fund. H. A. Field read a partial report of the minimum salary fund.

Report of Goodwill Industries. George Bowles read the report of the Goodwill Industries and on motion, it was adopted. (See Report.)

Introduction. J. M. M. Gray, Chancellor of the American University, was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interests of that Institution.

Report of the Old People's Home. E. D. Dimond read the report of the Old People's Home and, on motion, it was adopted. (See Report.)

Resolution. E. D. Dimond presented the following resolution:

"This report recalls to us the long and notable services of Dr. Jas. E. Jacklin in connection with this Home at Chelsea. It has very largely been his wise and untiring devotion to its administration which has laid its secure foundations. Its spirit of kindly ministry and comfort to the aged reflects his own unselfish character. That this living memorial of our fine conference associate may go on from strength to strength is our devout desire, therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Conference record its deep and abiding gratitude to Doctor Jacklin and pray that the peace of God may richly abide upon him in this later afternoon of his life."

On motion, it was adopted.

Letter of Greeting. On motion, the Secretary was instructed to send the greetings of the Conference to J. E. Jacklin.

Report of the Methodist Foundation of Michigan. F. B. Johnston read the report of the Methodist Foundation of Michigan. On motion, it was adopted. (See Report.)

Report of the Methodist Children's Home Society. E. J. Warren read the Report of the Methodist Children's Home Society and on motion, it was adopted. (See Report.)

Introduction. Miss Frances Knight, Director of the Methodist Children's Home Society, was introduced and spoke on the work of the Society.

Announcement of Change in Committee. The Bishop announced that Edgar Flory was placed on the Board of Ministerial Training in place of James Lawson, who was transferred out of the Conference.

Program To Be Followed. On motion, the Conference ordered that we proceed according to Program and have the Bishop's Devotional Address at 11:30 o'clock.

Recess. Recess was ordered until 11 o'clock.

Recess Ended. On call of the Bishop, the Conference came to order at 11 o'clock.

Executive Session. On motion, the Conference went into Executive Session at 11 o'clock.

Resolution of Co-operation with the Board of Home Missions. On motion of Walter A. Fruit, the Conference pledged its co-operation with the Bishop, the

District Superintendents, the Conference Board of Home Missions, and with the Home Board to do our part in the securing of \$300,000 as extra offering with World Service Credit for the aid in the liquidation of church debts, under certain conditions.

Question Thirty-two called. Under call of question of Thirty-two, C. P. Shapter and A. A. Ziarko were located at their own request.

Question Thirty-three Called. Under call of Question Thirty-three, J. J. Szczepkowski was located.

Questions Thirty-four, Thirty-five, and Thirty-seven Called. Under call of Questions Thirty-four, Thirty-five, and Thirty-seven, the answer to each is none.

Question Forty Called. Under call of Question Forty, the following were placed in the Retired Relation: A. T. Camburn, H. J. B. Marsh, C. J. Moeller, and James S. Steinger.

Action Deferred. On motion, action regarding R. C. TenBroeck was deferred to a later Executive Session.

Executive Session Closed. The time for the Bishop's Devotional Address having arrived, on motion the Executive Session was closed.

Devotions. The Hymn No. 134, "When Gathering Clouds Around, I View," was sung under the leadership of David Shugg.

Bishop Leonard spoke eloquently on, "The Silences of Jesus."

Session Closed. The benediction pronounced by the Bishop, brought the morning session to a close.

UNITED SESSION, FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Opening Session. Under the leadership of David Shugg, the Hymn No. 423, "Where Cross the Crowded Ways of Life," was sung.

N. A. Richards, a layman of First Church, Saginaw, led in prayer.

The Hymn No. 312, "O Happy Day," was sung.

Question Two Called. Under call of Question Two, "Is the Annual Conference Incorporated according to the requirement of the Discipline?" the answer is yes.

Question Four Called. Under call of Question Four, it was stated that the reports of the Statistician and Treasurer were not ready.

Questions Five and Seven Called. Under call of Questions Five and Seven, the answer is, see report of the Commission on Finance.

Question Six Called. Under call of Question Six, the answer is none.

Questions Nine and Ten Called. Under call of Questions Nine and Ten the answer is, see report of the Commission on Evaluation and Adequate Support of our Ministry.

Question Eight Called. Under call of Question Eight, the answer is none.

Question Eleven Called. Under call of Question Eleven, the answer is, see report of the Commission on Evangelism.

Question Twelve Called. Under call of Question Twelve the answer is, see report of the Committee on Nominations.

Report of Board of Education. Marshall R. Reed and Dr. F. C. Eiselen, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Education, spoke in the interests of education.

Peter Stair read a resolution from the Conference Board of Education. On motion, it was adopted. (See Report of Board of Education.)

Re. E. W. Blakeman's Work at the University of Michigan. The Secretary read a statement from the office of the President of the University of Michigan regarding an experiment in religious education at the University under the leadership of E. W. Blakeman.

On motion of F. G. Poole, the statement was received and the Conference pledged its co-operation. (See Statement.)

Announcement. C. L. Adams announced the time and place of the Annual Reunion Dinner for Retired Ministers and their wives.

District Superintendent's Report. F. M. Field, District Superintendent of the Port Huron District, read the composite report of the District Superintendents.

Bishop Leonard called the attention of the Conference to this masterpiece on the State of the Church within the bounds of the Detroit Conference. It was a superb and significant utterance.

On motion, it was received. (See Report.)

Committee on Change of Time of Conference Session. On motion of S. D. Eva, a committee was appointed consisting of one minister and one layman from each district to bring in a report regarding the paragraph in the District Superintendents' Report, having to do with the change from a fall to a spring conference.

The Committee is as follows:

Report of Commission on Evaluation and Adequate Support. E. M. Moore read the First Section of the Report of the Commission on Evaluation and Adequate Support as follows:

I. The Minimum Salary Plan

The operation of this Plan has proven the loyalty of our ministry to those who bear the burden of inadequate support at its most acute point—the bare

subsistence end of the salary scale. Thirty members of the Conference have received from this Fund payments supplementing their local support and maintaining our Conference minimum at approximately \$800. The aid extended has ranged from small amounts to \$270. This Fund has drawn upon the Board of Home Missions for less than was anticipated a year ago. Ninety-seven per cent of our men have met their assessments to this Fund so heartily and its ministry is so satisfactory that we recommend its operation be continued with the present scale of sharing; and that as soon as receipts, or re-arrangement of churches, make it possible, that the Commission be instructed to raise the salary minimum.

On motion of H. G. Pearce, it was adopted.

Section II on the District Superintendents' Support was read as follows:

We recommend that the claim be determined on the present basis and rates.

On motion, it was adopted.

Section III on the Conference Claimants' Support, was read as follows:

One year ago under the financial depression, we ordered the lowest apportionment that our Conference has known in many years. In some few cases it was below the amount which certain groups had given. We were under the pressure of an insistent demand that the rates be lowered, at least temporarily. On the other hand, we feel the injustice we are doing our claimants with such a painfully inadequate support, and must recover our lost ground as soon as possible. The Commission after much discussion concluded that the times do not warrant our advancing the present rate of apportionment.

The Commission recommends that the Conference order an apportionment to each charge of 25 cents per capita (full active member) plus an amount equal to the sliding scale of percentage of the cash salaries paid to the pastor or pastors as published in the Minutes of 1933 (page 52). The house rent shall not be included. The per capita and percentage shall be computed upon the figures as published in the Minutes of 1934. We urge our ministers to make monthly or quarterly payments of this proration on the basis of this budget of claims; the final prorating for the year, however, shall be based upon a budget of claims in harmony with the actual receipts.

On motion, it was adopted.

Section IV on Conference Self-Evaluation was read as follows:

IV. Conference Self-Evaluation

Your commission has held extended sessions in the consideration of this subject. Sub-committees have worked faithfully on detailed assignments. Groups have tried various experiments. Other groups have been in conference with educators at our State University who have specialized in personnel administration; and a sub-committee of three—which included Brother Frederick B. Johnston, who is close to the mind of all our ministry, and Frank N. Miner who has taken a course in personnel administration at the University and who has unstintedly used his time and talent to patiently work out a wealth of detail,—this sub-committee prepared, out of a mass of material, an

eight-page syllabus setting forth our purpose, problems, typical elements, phases of functioning, differentiation of fields, descriptive ratings, final evaluation, safeguards and the spirit in which the evaluation should proceed. This syllabus was mimeographed and as a basis of further study was placed in the hands of each of the 22 members of the Commission and of about the same number of ministers outside of the Commission, with the request that criticisms and suggestions be frankly and fully made to this sub-committee. The result was something of a cross-section of the reaction of the whole conference would make and has been very valuable. Most of the criticisms were constructive. The result has modified our procedure in several particulars.

Let me give one illustration of our change of approach. In our first set-up of the matter of securing Descriptive Ratings (the factual basis of seeing the man as he is) which become an important factor in his Final Evaluation, we decided to ask for these descriptive ratings from certain officers of the Conference, heads of committees, and local parish committees. But here we saw that we were running into one of the serious fears of our ministry, namely, that this evaluation procedure was going to set up a Star-chamber or Inquisitorial Court that might be highly prejudicial to a fair and brotherly estimate of some men. A brother might feel that the persons thus designated to described him factually were "stacked against him." From the beginning we have sought to protect each man from any unfairness; and when this response to the syllabus came we shifted our approach to the securing of necessary information. We said, let us invite the candidate to nominate nearly all of the ten or dozen individuals who are to give him his descriptive rating; choosing one District Superintendent, one predecessor or successor, five other members of the Conference, two or three laymen from charges served, and finally the man be asked to make his own response to the Descriptive questionnaire. Our approach was an effort to demonstrate our desire to make this process as fair and brotherly as possible.

Our work as an Evaluation Commission has only well begun. We know what should be our goal and some of the steps by which to proceed. We are learning much from the work done in several trades and professions where this Self-evaluation has come to stay, because it has proven its value in the increased efficiency of those who submit to its appraisal. If we can overcome our fears and learn to trust each other's sense of fairness there is no reason why this accredited process should not be applied to the christian ministry. We are the first to seriously consider Conference self-evaluation. None of us enjoy criticism but none of us escape it. The question is, Shall we seek to develop a criticism that will be scientific, faithful and genuinely fraternal? Shall we try to improve our ministry, year after year, by a scientific and conscientious study of standards and personal approximations? Or shall we leave our perfecting to the chance approach of an occasional superintendent (who can help the younger men but hardly dares to offer suggestions to those who are so much like himself)—or a rare and frank friend?—or to our enemies, who often do us good when their whispered ratings reach our ears and make us smart and think?—or shall we leave this large responsibility where it has largely rested, on the faithfulness of the minister's wife? If it can be done it is high time that the christian ministry

put itself to the task of a thorough study of its actual value and the standards toward which to aim in the efforts at increased evaluation.

We have stated, in this syllabus, as *The Spirit of the Experiment*, that it is our purpose to enrich our brotherly consideration for each other; discover our weaknesses, and strengthen each other at such points; to cultivate the courage which faces constructive criticism; to learn more of the art of thinking together. We have no desire or intent to interfere with the appointing or administrative powers of the Conference. Our primary purpose is not to crowd out any member of this body (although lifting the standards may have that effect in a few cases). Our primary motive is to stimulate rather than eliminate, to reward rather than to punish.

And in the Spirit of that declaration your Commission recommends that Conference action be taken.

1. Authorizing the Commission on Evaluation and Adequate Support to proceed experimentally in developing a technique for the evaluation of the Detroit Conference.

2. That a limited number of our Conference membership—the first twenty-five to volunteer—be used as the subjects of this experiment during the ensuing year.

3. That the Commission on Finance be instructed to provide in its budget \$25 to be applied to the expenses of the Evaluation Commission.

On motion, it was adopted.

On motion, the Report as a whole was adopted.

Introduction. D. D. Spellman of Detroit, the President of the Lay Conference, was introduced. He stated that G. P. Waller of Pontiac, had been elected the Vice-President, and L. O. Moody of Port Huron, as Secretary-Treasurer.

Report of Commission on Finance. E. A. Smith, a layman, read the report of the Commission on Finance.

On motion, this section was adopted.

World Service

The Conference Goal for World Service Giving for the coming year shall be fixed at \$106,000.00, the money so received to be distributed according to the so-called Kennedy Plan as in effect during the year just closing, and as modified by the Allocation Plan in the latter paragraph on "World Service."

That we approve the Allocation Plan for handling the World Service funds and refer the adaptation adjustment of this plan for the Detroit Conference to the State World Service Council and the Commission on Finance with power.

On motion, this section was adopted.

District Superintendents' Claim

1. The apportionment of the churches for the District Superintendents' Claim shall be 7% of the Pastor's cash salary, except where the house rent is paid by the Pastor, and in such cases, the apportionment shall be 6% of the cash salary.

2. The scale of distribution of the District Superintendents' Fund shall be left as it is at the present time, pending the recommendation of the District Superintendents to be presented at a meeting of the Finance Commission early in the Conference year and approved by the Commission.

On motion, this section was adopted.

Conference Minutes and Secretarial Expenses

1. The expense of publishing the minutes shall be reduced by using less expensive art paper, the elimination of certain material already agreed upon by the Conference secretaries and the Commission, the condensing of reports of committees, when published in the Minutes, and in a number of other ways, already worked out with the secretaries, the Commission and the printers, it being understood that the value of the Minutes as a record of Conference action shall in no way be injured.

2. The assessment upon the churches for the Conference Minutes and other Conference Expenses shall be $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1% of the pastor's cash salary.

3. The collection of the assessment for the Conference Minutes and secretarial expenses shall be committed to a financial secretary, who shall be named by, and work as an assistant to, the Secretary of the Conference.

4. Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed from the Conference Expense Fund for the Committee on Evaluation and Adequate Support for necessary mimeograph work during the year.

5. Secretary be instructed to publish the pastoral record including P. O. address instead of the alphabetical roll.

On motion, this section was adopted.

Equalization of Travelling Expenses

Expenses to and from the Annual Conference shall be based upon the following items:

1. An allowance of 1½ cents per mile road mileage for each pastor.
2. Ferry allowance of \$3.00 per car for cars actually coming from the Upper Peninsula.
3. Hotel allowance of \$2.00 to those who live more than 300 miles from the seat of Conference.
4. The cost is to be pro-rated according to cash salary.

On motion, this section was adopted.

Anti-Saloon League

We recommend the work of the Anti-Saloon League to our churches.

On motion, this section was adopted.

On motion, the Report as a whole was adopted.

Endorsement of Action of Commission on Finance. On motion of H. A. Field, the Conference endorsed the action of the Commission on Finance in loaning \$225 to the Secretarial Expense Fund for payment of the publication and mailing of the Minutes of the 1933 Conference Session and authorized the Treasurer to repay the loan out of the first receipts of this year's Secretarial Expense Fund.

Question Three Called. Under call of Question Three it was stated that the various Officers and Persons holding Moneys, Funds, etc., are bonded as follows:

Frederick B. Johnston, \$10,000 as Treasurer of the Board of Stewards, and \$10,000 as Executive Secretary Endowment Fund Commission; W. H. Young, \$10,000 as Conference Treasurer; C. E. Clark, Alfred E. Way, F. B. Johnston and Bookkeeper at the Foundation office, \$12,000 blanket bond for Methodist Foundation of Michigan; also treasurer of the Committee on Finance, amount to be determined by the Committee.

Extension of Time Not Granted. A motion to extend the time of the afternoon session was lost.

Close of Session. The hour having arrived for the third of the Sesqui-Centennial Lectures, the business session closed.

FOURTH DAY

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1934

Opening of Session. The session of the Fourth Day was opened with the singing of Hymn No. 310, "And Can It Be That I should Gain?"

The Conference read the Eighth Reading for Special Days, on Education.

Marshall W. Hoyt led in prayer.

Announcement of Death of a Member. Announcement was made of the death of Earl Hoon. The Conference, bearing in mind the bereaved family, sang the Hymn No. 333, "Jesus, Thy Boundless Love to Me."

Journal Read and Approved. The Journal of the United Session of Friday afternoon was read, corrected, and approved.

Endowment Fund Commission. F. B. Johnston read the Report of the Endowment Fund Commission. On motion, the Report and the recommendations contained therein were adopted. (See Report.)

Check Received. F. B. Johnston presented the check of the Endowment Fund Commission. It was for \$10,000 and on motion was ordered turned over to the Board of Stewards.

Statements of Appreciation. H. A. Field, E. J. Warren, W. R. Fruit, and D. C. Littlejohn spoke in high terms of appreciation of the exceedingly efficient work of F. B. Johnston, Executive Secretary of the Endowment Fund Commission.

Bronson Methodist Hospital. In the absence of Dr. W. M. Puffer, the Secretary read the Report of Bronson Methodist Hospital. On motion, it was adopted. (See Report.)

Detroit Conference Preachers' Fund. The presentation of the Detroit Conference Preachers' Fund was set for Monday morning.

Introduction. Dr. Allan MacRossie, Executive Secretary of the Commission on Courses of Study, was introduced and spoke in the interests of the Courses of Study.

World Service Commission. On motion, the Committee on Nominations was instructed to name a Detroit Conference Commission on World Service.

Commission for Promotion of the Advocate. S. D. Eva presented the Report of the Commission for Promotion of the Advocate. On motion, the Recommendations of the Commission were adopted. (See Report.)

H. G. Pearce spoke in the interests of the Advocate.

Bishop Leonard spoke on Methodist Literature and the need of it in our Methodist Homes.

The Michigan Christian Advocate. Dr. W. H. Phelps presented the Report of the Michigan Christian Advocate. On motion, it was adopted. (See Report.)

Committee on Moral and Social Reform. R. M. Atkins, chairman of the Committee on Moral and Social Reform, asked that by common consent the Report be considered paragraph by paragraph.

Ralph Harper read the Report of the Committee.

The Introduction to the Report was read and, on motion was adopted.

Section I on The Way of Social Justice was read through Item I and on motion was adopted.

Section I, Item 2, was read and, on motion, was adopted.

Section I, Item 3, was read, and amended to read as follows :

"That we believe selfish competitive methods to be contrary to the spirit of Jesus Christ."

On motion, it was adopted as amended.

Section I, Item 4, was read, and on motion was adopted.

Section I, Item 5, was read, and on motion, was recommitted to the Committee for reconsideration and restatement.

Section I, Item 6, was read, and on motion, was recommitted to the Committee for further consideration.

Section I, Item 7, was read, and on motion, was adopted.

Section I, Item 8, was read and amended to read as follows:

"That we declare that labor has the right to their own organizations and the right of collective bargaining with employers of labor."

On motion, it was adopted as amended.

Section II on The Way of World Peace was read through Item 1, and on motion, was adopted.

Section II, Item 2, was read, and on motion, was adopted.

Section II, Item 3, was read, and on motion, was adopted.

Section II, Item 4, was read, and on motion, was ordered stricken out.

Section II, Item 5, was read, and on motion, was adopted.

Section II, Item 6, was read, and on motion was ordered stricken out.

Time for Devotions. The hour for the devotions having arrived and on motion, further consideration of the Report was laid over until the afternoon session.

Request. On motion, the Committee was requested to bring in a statement regarding the League of Decency.

Offering for Mrs. Seth Reed. The Conference took an offering for the aid of Mrs. Seth Reed. The Offering amounted to \$59.

Reception of Class. Howard F. Snell, having satisfactorily answered the Disciplinary Questions, was admitted into Full Membership.

Close of Session. The Session was brought to a close with prayer and benediction by the Bishop.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON UNITED SESSION

Opening of Session. The united session was opened by the singing of the Hymn No. 186, "I Worship Thee, O Holy Ghost."

The Conference repeated the Lord's Prayer.

Introduction. The evangelists, Miss Grace Bonnie and Miss Ilcene Wingard, were introduced.

Dr. Dunning Richardson, of the Board of Home Missions, was introduced and spoke on the work of the Board.

Committee on Moral and Social Reform. The Report of the Committee on Moral and Social Reform was resumed.

Ralph Harper read the restatement of Items 5 and 6 of Section I of the original report that had been recommitted. On motion, it was adopted.

Section II, Item 7, was read, and on motion, was adopted.

The statement regarding the Movement for Better and Cleaner Movies was read, and on motion, was adopted.

On motion, the Report as a whole as amended was adopted. (See Report.)

Resolution. On motion of C. P. Bayless, the following Resolution was adopted:

"That we ask the District Superintendents to make it an objective during the visitation of the charges instructing our Quarterly Conferences concerning the Christian Issues outlined in the Report of the Committee on Moral and Social Reform as adopted."

Offering for Janitor. An offering, amounting to \$25.72, was taken for the janitor.

Completing of Disciplinary Questions. On motion, the Bishop and the Secretaries were authorized to fill in the items relating to the Treasurer's and Statistician's Report, etc., that have to do with the United Session.

Deferred. The Report of the Special Committee on the change of time for the holding of the Annual Conference was deferred until Monday morning and the Conference was granted the power to act.

Editing of Journal of United Session. On motion, the Secretary was authorized to edit the Journal of the United Session.

United Session Adjourned. The business of the United Session being complete the United Session stood adjourned.

Ministerial Session. The Bishop declared that we were in session as an Annual Conference.

Lake Louise Property. On motion, the following resolution presented by H. Addison Leeson was adopted:

"Therefore be it Resolved, That the Detroit Conference join the Michigan Conference in heartily endorsing the action of the METHODIST FOUNDATION in provisionally accepting the gift in the name of the Conferences. And that the Conferences without assuming any financial burden, do agree to offer the project their full moral support and co-operation."

Reception on Trial. Under call of Question Seventeen, Sydney Everson was Received on Trial and placed in the Studies of the First Year.

Question Twenty-six Called. Under call of Question Twenty-six, Sydney Everson was Left Without Appointment to Attend One of Our Schools.

Question Forty Called. The Bishop called the names of the Retired Brethren. Many spoke briefly and messages were received from several who were not able to be in attendance at the Conference.

III

We recommend that your Board of Trustees be authorized to sell and convey a vacant lot formerly occupied by the Long Rapids Methodist Episcopal Church of Saginaw District and that the proceeds be loaned to the Hilman Methodist Episcopal Church on the same district, according to the provisions of the discipline.

IV

We recommend that your Board of Trustees be authorized and empowered to take whatever steps may be necessary to legalize and complete the sale and conveyance of the Long Lake Methodist Episcopal Church on Saginaw District, this sale having been made some years ago by George Smith, the pastor of the church.

Upon motion the various recommendations were adopted, and the entire report adopted. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

PART VI.—REPORTS

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT, 1934

Bishop Leonard and Members of the United Sessions:

In the sesqui-centennial year we come to this 79th session of the Detroit Annual Conference with reverent appreciation of the hosts of Methodist pastors of the past one hundred fifty years; but with a sincere desire to be found as faithful in our day as they were in theirs. We welcome Bishop Leonard with open hearts and ready minds, eagerly receiving the inspiration and counsel which he brings; at the same time not forgetting the unceasing labors and efficient leadership of our resident Bishop, Edgar Blake.

Death has taken three pastors in the midst of their labors, A. B. Jones, a useful supply pastor; Henry Rogers, long a choice spirit of the Marquette district; and Harry Biddlecomb, called home on Christmas Sunday before the altar of Epworth Church, Detroit. For the most part the pastors have been blessed with vigor to carry on in an exacting period. Several came through serious operations, Karl Patow, W. B. Weaver, Jas. Chapman, John Somers and George Nevins. Serious illness befell J. S. Steininger and C. P. Shapter, the former requesting retirement and the latter location at this session.

The Superintendents, in administering their districts, giving counsel and leadership to the churches traveled 103,000 miles, conducted 627 Quarterly Conferences, preached over 600 times, besides delivering lectures and other addresses and participating in business and committee meetings almost without number. Office work required in administration involved the writing of more than 6,000 personal letters besides many circular messages to the pastors.

Bishop Blake attended district meetings in all the districts, bringing inspiration and encouragement, and visited many local churches at anniversaries, dedications and rallies. The superintendents have had his wise counsel constantly, and for the purpose of conference on programs and problems they have spent fifteen days together between annual conferences, including two days at a very helpful meeting of the superintendents from both Indiana and Michigan at South Bend, Ind.

The Superintendents have found the last quarterly conferences greatly hampered by the vacation season when town folks are away and country folks are rushed with harvesting. Some of the most successful conferences are the early ones in May and June. It seems that this condition would be remedied by an annual conference in June.

Churches and pastors coming to us from the Central German Conference have been cordially welcomed into the district fellowships and the superintendents have found associations with these new charges interesting and pleasant. Placing a pastor in Immanuel church, East Detroit, when C. J. Moeller was made agent for Berea Orphanage, started an unusual number of midseason appointments and new pastors began work February 1st in East Detroit, Mt. Hope, Northville, Lincoln Park, Fremont Ave., Bay City, Chelsea, Marine City, Freeland, Caseville and Gaines.

Centennial celebrations have been held at South Lyon, Saline, Macon, and First Church, Port Huron, and Utica celebrated 110 years of history. Plans are laid for Centennials during the coming year at Northville and Newburg and the 108th anniversary at St. Clair. Another centenary was that of Timothy Edwards, who on Easter Sunday celebrated one hundred years of glorious living by preaching in the church at Washington. The Sesqui-Centennial of American Methodism will have attention in many churches during the fall months, the history of our church being stressed by sermons, plays and pageants. The special course presented in our Sunday School literature offers unusual opportunity for developing a deeper appreciation of the historical backgrounds out of which our church has come, and it might well be supplemented by earnest messages from the pulpits, in which the great souls of our early history might become "a cloud of witnesses" inspiring to steadfastness and zeal.

PROPERTY—There are 521 churches operating in the Detroit Conference and six closed churches have been reopened this year, Bethel on the Davisburg charge, and Gordonville, Spratt, Ocqueoc, Waverly, and Biggs on Saginaw District. A new society has been organized with fifty charter members at Galloway Lake near Pontiac. A Grange hall is being moved onto a lot, all paid for, as the first unit of the church, and an abandoned church added to this unit, will make a serviceable church. No churches have been closed because of the depression but many are being maintained by the missionary spirit of pastors where the support is barely enough to pay transportation. There are churches and entire circuits which would have dispensed with pastoral leadership but for the encouragement and direction by district superintendents.

Shortly after conference the beautiful new Immanuel church in East Detroit, a modernized English Gothic structure built of Bedford stone at a cost of \$26,000, was dedicated by Bishop Blake and now is all paid for except the pipe organ. A new cobblestone church at Hubbard Lake, Ossineke charge, was dedicated in July. On the Port Huron District two new parish houses have been erected, a frame unit costing \$2400 being added to the Utica church, and a cobblestone social hall for the church at Deford being built with money from the sale of a parsonage and an abandoned church. Lincoln Park, Detroit, after worshipping twelve years in a basement, is building a \$40,000 church with donated materials and labor and a possible expenditure of only \$4,000. Under the direction of the pastor, J. W. LeVan, as architect, engineer and superintendent, the superstructure is being erected, proceeding only as cash and donated labor and materials are available, but it is hoped to have the building ready for dedication by New Year. At Pickford on the Marquette district, where William Combella last conference inherited an ash heap, now stands the closed in structure of a beautiful new church designed by our Church Board of Architects, most of the work being donated. A lovely chapel in Bergland was dedicated early in the conference year. A new log church at Hulbert, on Alvin Doten's trap-line of churches, will be the only Protestant church within a radius of 80 miles. Salisbury church is reducing its size to fit present conditions. Romeo and Oxford church were badly wrecked by a tornado August 2nd but are being restored with insurance money. Romeo's historic 175 feet steeple, had to come down. With \$3500 Oxford church will be modernized and made better than ever.

Remodeling, repairs and redecorating of churches and parsonages have been more extensive than for several years, and much of the work has been done by volunteer labor. Ann Arbor district reports a remodeled church house and new furnace at Adrian, extensive alterations on four churches of the Milan parish, redecorated auditoriums at Plymouth, Samaria, Lambertville, Springville, Wyandotte, and a new asbestos roof for the Clinton church given by a devoted layman. On Detroit district Covenant purchased lots with a convenient building on them, First Church, Highland Park, is building an addition and installing a pipe organ, Clarenceville is remodeling the church exterior, Christ installed a pipe organ, Holmes and Preston put in new heating plants, North Detroit and Woodmere redecorated their auditoriums, Whitefield renovated its church and Thoburn installed new pews and altar. Howell is spending \$2,000 on its church interior. Marquette district improvements are noted at Marquette, Painesdale, Ontonogan, Newberry, Republic, Bessemer, Gwinn, Iron Mt. First, Ishpeming, Lake Linden and L'Anse. On Saginaw district Thoburn church, Bay City, made extensive repairs after a fire. Madison Ave. plant is greatly improved, Midland, Pinconning, Alger and Tuscola St., Saginaw, have undergone alterations. Sandusky church, was redecorated inside and out. New parsonages have been purchased for Epworth and Ferndale, Detroit, Oakland Park, Pontiac. Fire destroyed parsonages at Oak Grove and Laingsburg, but the latter already has a new, modern home in consequence.

It is sad to relate that in a few instances property improvements have been made at the expense of the minister's salary. More than one new furnace or freshly painted church should bear the label, "Paid for by the preacher." It is refreshing to note that churches are not going into debt for improvements; too many are staggering under loads of debt incurred in prosperous times.

Some churches have reduced property debts. Fenton paid \$818 on principal; at Escanaba, debts went down and salary up; Iron Mt. Central reduced its debt; Harrisville burned a \$1,500 mortgage; Lakeview, Flint, is discharging a \$5,600 mortgage with real estate held by the Methodist Union. Offsets in closed banks have reduced debts in some instances. Wayne reduced a \$60,000 debt to \$7,000 by offsets; Plymouth is refinancing \$24,000 of mortgage

bonds at \$6,000; South Lyon is offsetting \$6,000; Lake Orion, \$3,000; Keego Harbor, \$1,620. In other cases encumbered societies have been granted a moratorium on interest, a reduction in interest rates, or some other concession, but many concessions must be forthcoming before the churches can show much progress in dealing with the debt problem.

MINISTERIAL SUPPORT—This has not been an easy year financially and yet the churches have weathered the storm better than most institutions. Smaller deficits in ministerial support will be reported than last year. Estimates for ministerial support are being reduced in many instances; but this often means an actual increase in salary paid. Salary receipts are in most cases above those of a year ago. Some encouraging increases are reported: Court St., Flint; Wayne, Berkley and Lincoln Park, \$500; Escanaba, \$300; and substantial increases at E. Grand Blvd., Flint, Milford, Holly, Cass City, Deckerville, Dexter, Trenton, Madison Ave. and Fremont Ave., Bay City and Midland.

Present salaries, are woefully inadequate. Many pastors have cashed in life insurance to carry on. Those receiving less than \$1,000 have really suffered. But the heroism shown by pastors in the face of inadequate support has been marvelous. Occasionally we find official boards hiding behind the depression to cut down salaries needlessly. A few have cut below the figures actually raised these past two difficult years. Not all the churches are doing their best. Bills are paid first and the pastor gets what is left. Many members maintain standards of comfort and luxury and reduce their support to the church. Professing inability to give to God's work, they still maintain social and amusement standards, buy new cars, attend World's Fair, etc.

But, fortunately, this is not the general attitude. Giving has been generally loyal and in many instances sacrificial. Some have given beyond their ability, which ought not to be necessary if all did their share. The difficulty in most cases is a lack of adequate plan and method. A fair application of the Disciplinary, Financial plan and the acceptance of the principles of Christian stewardship would provide financial resources for all our church needs, even in hardest times. Few churches make thorough financial canvasses. Most efforts are superficial and incomplete and often conducted in an apologetic manner. When efforts are carefully planned and well executed without apology, results are gratifying. But adequate financial methods in many churches will not be carried out without the initiative and leadership of the pastor. Caring for the finances is the laymen's task, but setting up the program and the inspiration and impulse for its execution must usually be furnished by the pastor. We need a new study of our financial procedure. A meeting of the pastors and treasurers of Saginaw district, after surveying present needs, advocated a district wide Every Member Visitation, simultaneously conducted with appropriate publicity, exchange of pastors and the inspiration of a general campaign.

The Minimum Salary plan, to provide each full time pastor with at least \$800 and house through pastoral sharing, has received gratifying support, only five pastors out of 285 failing to pay into the fund. It merits universal support, and the minimum should be raised as rapidly as conditions permit, perhaps to \$900 for next year.

The disciplinary requirement of prorating the four items of ministerial support has been observed more generally this year, and increasingly payments for Superintendents, Bishops and Conference Claimants have been made through the year. The universal adoption of this practice would aid the pastor's net receipts as well as these other claims. We should devise a simpler method of computing the Conference Claimants apportionment, eliminating church membership figures as a factor. (This will remove the incentive for slashing membership rolls unduly).

WORLD SERVICE—Benevolences have continued to suffer this year, because of financial conditions and the emphasis and needs of local budgets and debts; but a more serious cause is the lack of missionary passion and indefiniteness of presentation on the part of ministers. In most cases, if giving has slumped this year, it is because the pastor's missionary zeal has languished. Too many pastors have yielded to an ungrounded fear that missionary promotion will hurt their salary receipts. They should remember the advice of Phillips Brooks, that the best tonic for a struggling congregation is missionary sermons and missionary collections. There are discouragements and staggering demands in every congregation, but the church that succeeds is the one that looks outside itself, and gives and does for others. The time has come for advance, not by the force of apportionments which have largely lost their appeal, but by rebuilding a missionary consciousness in our churches and giving them information of

the work and needs in the world field. The adoption of our Parish Abroad in Northwest India and the visitation of Dr. Templin through the districts have helped to create new interest, and still more information and literature from this source should be provided. We urge the observance of Missionary Sunday with the theme, that the Gospel of Christ is the only Code that can bring prosperity and security. An anonymous gift from Unionville of \$3,000 to World Service and \$2,000 to the retired ministers is announced.

ADVOCATE—For 60 years Michigan Methodism has had its own Advocate, for the circulation of connectational information, news and official communications from Bishops, missionaries, boards and institutions, as well as inspirational, religious and cultural literature for the cultivation of the christian life. This 60th anniversary should be used for restating the importance of our church paper to our church life and for increasing its usefulness by giving it more readers. It should be remembered that the Michigan Advocate belongs to us. Its interests are our interests. Its success is our success. Its failure would be our failure. Therefore, the cultivation of its circulation to the points of highest efficiency should be the responsibility of the Bishop, superintendents, pastors and official boards of our churches. Every pastor should feel it a part of his responsibility to place the Advocate in the homes of his people, a task which he assumes when he becomes a member of the conference.

CHRISTIAN TRAINING—The training of Christ's followers is as old as christianity itself. The only thing new about religious education is in the facilities and tools for this task, such as Church Schools, Epworth Leagues, Vacation Schools and Leadership Training. Real progress is being made in the technique of those facilities, and large use is being made of them. Daily vacation schools were more numerous and more successful than ever this summer, being almost universal in Flint, Ann Arbor and Detroit districts, and increasing in the others, mostly without paid workers. Many Standard Leadership Schools were conducted, and an increasing number of local churches are presenting standard training classes where the pastors have become accredited teachers.

Our young people in Epworth Leagues and other organizations have been showing a keen interest in the work of the church, and their group and district rallies have been attended by hosts of eager young folks. Many new leagues have been organized. Albion Institute is supported quite generally by the four lower districts, with great benefit to the charges which send delegations. Michigamme Institute for the Marquette and East Tawas for the Saginaw district serve a similar purpose for those sections. East Tawas drew the largest enrollment in its history, with 300. Port Huron District Training Conference for young people at Forester had a 25 per cent increase in attendance.

It is well that we have raised the standards of admission into our conference, so that eventually college and seminary will be required, but efficiency requires continued study and progressive self-improvement. The Graduate Summer School of Ministerial Training at Albion helps to meet this need. It should be made a great conference institution. So convinced are the superintendents of its value, that they are agreed to work it into their schedules and urge the attendance of all their men.

We must not forget our own Albion College which continues its constructive work for youth today. Its teachers are religious men and women. Its teaching is from the theistic point of view and the Christian philosophy of life. We congratulate President Seaton on the completion of ten significant years and bespeak for him our continued support.

EVANGELISM—The day of evangelism is by no means past. The altar call is a whole-some procedure and should be practiced more universally. Most of our pastors have given some evangelistic emphasis to their ministry, with varying degrees of success. Nearly all employed Passion Week effectively, but not so many attempted special campaigns at other than the Easter period. There is a danger of Holy Week meetings becoming formal and devoid of spiritual dynamic. We wonder if the fall months could not be more largely used for revival meetings as well as the Lenten period, and if longer periods than the customary two weeks might not be profitably devoted to "protracted" meetings. We hear it said that revival meetings are ineffective these days; but how do we know? Very few who make this assertion, have ever tried them. We are in danger of making too little effort along this line. However, many evangelistic meetings are reported and are worthy of mention if we had time. Only a few dependable evangelists are available and there is a need for every pastor and every church to be their own evangelists. Our pastors should study the experiences of successful pastor evangelists and seek to carry the spirit and purpose of evangelism into their entire program.

The evangelistic possibilities of the Sunday School, the regular Sunday services and pastoral visitation should be more generally utilized, and evangelism should be extended to the cultivation of young disciples in preparation for church membership and christian living. Sunday School evangelism should be a major emphasis through the year and not confined to Decision Day. Church Membership classes should be more extensive and more thorough. The German churches set a good example here. We should give more attention to the cultivation of home religion, and the personal and family life. The restoration of two time honored institutions, the Family Altar and the Family Pew, would do much to bring back the church's ebbing power. It is not enough to have our children in Sunday School. If they do not develop habits of church attendance and regular public worship we soon lose them to worldly and irreligious lives. More careful attention should be given by pastors to the manner of receiving persons into church membership and shepherding them after they are in. One of the tragedies of our modern church life is the easy way in which members may be lost out the back door. Bishop Blake's figures have revealed the amazing extent of this loss and should arouse every pastor to do all within his power as a shepherd of souls to stop the loss.

The crude and bungling way in which some pastors and membership committees go about revising church records is no less than a crime against personality. Our last General Conference gave us a clear statement of the procedure to be followed in placing names on the Inactive Membership roll. That procedure set forth in paragraph 60 should be carefully followed, and the careless and indifferent members should be considered an evangelistic responsibility.

The most successful pastors have been giving sympathetic attention to the needs of their people in these stressful times, proving themselves true shepherds and pastors. Almost invariably the pastor who gives the most attention to pastoral ministry among his people receives the largest proportion of his salary in these days of general deficits and builds his church into strength and loyalty. It is still true that a home going pastor makes a church going people. Yet many pastors neglect this phase of their ministry, to the detriment of their churches. Some even fail to mention their pastoral labors in their quarterly conference reports as if they were of little importance.

These are changing, crucial, challenging days, when the preacher must ever be alert to interpret the mind of Christ on great social questions and the glaring injustices of our world. Yet the deep spiritual needs of individuals are the same as in the days of our fathers. We must teach our people to hate war, oppression, intemperance and every social wrong; but in addition to this message of the prophet, we have a blessed gospel to declare of men's need and God's grace. The application of Christ's teaching to every relationship of life, the insistence of righteousness and justice everywhere, and the teaching of high moral ethics should go hand in hand with the preaching of a personal Gospel which meets the spiritual needs of folks; but the too exclusive preaching of a so-called "social-gospel" fails to meet the needs of human souls in our congregations or to build the church of God. We fear some of our pastors have fallen into this error. It is true, others have erred in having no message against the sins of society. But we need to be careful lest, in an effort to apply christian teachings to all of life, we fall into the error of discussing social and economic questions such as our people hear over the radio and read in the newspapers, and fail to inspire, nourish and strengthen them for christian living. It does not help our discouraged and bewildered people to be continually reminded of the terrible state of things for which they are not responsible. They need to be assured that God still reigns and cares for his children. The Kingdom of God is infinitely more than the remodeling of society on the lines of Christian Socialism. It may include that. But fundamentally the Kingdom of God is within the hearts of men, and our preaching must deal with fundamentals, and not too much with incidentals. We must preach certainties, not doubts; preach victory, not defeat; preach comforting, not depressing sermons; preach age-long fundamentals, not half-baked theories; preach the realities of religious experience, not merely point out the inadequacies of narrow creeds; preach eternal verities, and not temporal theories and experiment. We need to put assurance into the hearts of our people, not doubts into their minds. We have a great gospel of the adequacy of Christ for every life and for all of life. Let us preach it without hesitation or apology, and live it to the limit. In the name of the Lord Christ, whose we are and whom we serve, let us go forward and upward, pointing and leading a disheartened, disillusioned world, out of its bewilderment and despair.

CONFERENCE REPORT OF THE OLD PEOPLE'S HOME

The Trustees of your Old Peoples Home have another trying year to report owing to the continuance of business depression. Yet, withal, it has been one of the most useful years to our elderly people in all the 98 years of its comforting, and gracious ministry. We are grateful to be able to report that to date this has been done. The Home "owes no man anything." There is no mortgage against the Home nor ever has been. Every bill for supplies and help is paid and there is cash in the current fund of \$900.00.

The operating capital of the Home today consists of \$10,000 cash; \$100,000 in good salable securities and \$350,000 in holdings of real estate, mortgages, bonds, stocks, etc., of uncertain value. Better times will reveal the comfortable fact that our Home is in a secure financial condition with whatever losses which have come finally charged of the books. Until such days, our policy must be very conservative and unflinchingly economical in administration.

Our entire outlay for the year has been \$29,179.00. Almost \$2,500 per month. However this total includes \$6,696 paid on annuities, taxes, interest, etc., on properties owned by the Home. This leaves the actual expense of maintaining the Home support at \$22,476.00 or \$275.00 per member. A few years ago the average expense per member was around \$400.00. Which is a very practical evidence of frugality and care in the management.

During the year eleven members of the Home have died; two have withdrawn for personal reasons. Thirteen new members have been admitted. One of these was our aged veteran of the conference—Rev. N. Norton Clark who celebrated his 93rd birthday last summer. Our

new members also include the widow of Rev. P. C. J. Macauley. Three others have already been accepted and will move to the Home within a few weeks.

It is a matter of regret that Dr. and Mrs. Balmer, who have given the Home seven years of most excellent service, have now found it desirable to retire and establish themselves in their own Home in Port Huron. They carry with them the "well done" of the family and the management. Dr. H. Addis Leeson has been chosen to succeed Dr. Balmer as Superintendent and Mrs. E. P. Bennett entered upon her duties as matron on August 1st and has already demonstrated her unusual adaptation and fine resources for this difficult task. Doctor Leeson's familiarity with the ideals cherished for the Home and the various phases of its management together with his wide acquaintance in the conference and his own fine personal qualities; give well nigh conclusive assurance of successful service in his two fold capacity as both superintendent and executive secretary.

The writer of this report regrets his inability to be present and to read it himself. This must of necessity be his last report. The passage of the years have reduced his strength so that he can no longer carry the burden. He has devoted thirty years to this cause and it is dear to his heart. They have been years of blessing for which he is grateful. He would thank the members of the conference for their unflinching courtesies and aid and pleads for a continuance of their loyalty to all the interests of the Home.

MICHIGAN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

Without a day's vacation, we have plugged along the Advocate trail, writing the best we could, preaching every Sunday, teaching the Advocate Course in Metropolitan and Detroit Central churches, conducting a worldwide Bible Study Course, supervising the work of shop and office, yelling early and late for new subscribers, hanging on like grim death to the old ones—assimilating equally large quantities of praise and criticism and have come "smilin' through," somewhat the worse for wear.

All that we dare to plead for before the conferences is the verdict, "It might have been worse."

WHERE WE ARE

On September 1, the circulation stood at 10,618, an increase of 818 over the year before. One pastor just transferred in, brought in one-third of that increase. 370 pastors helped to make the total of new subscribers, 2,395. If there were no "stops," what a world this would be! It shows how we have to "keep running to stay where we are."

That it took grit, grace and gumption to get the new subscribers is evidenced by the fact that in the best Advocate-reading area in Methodism, there were still 179 of our pastors who toiled all night, according to their reports, and yet caught not even one little subscriber for the Advocate.

THE OLD DOLLAR MARK

The plant has been run as economically as we know how to run it. The wages of the linotype operators are fixed by the N. R. A. at \$1.10 an hour, for a forty-hour week, with \$1.65 for overtime.

We are running on a budget far below the peak. The salary of the associate editor was then \$2,400 and that of the editor \$5,000. The former item was eliminated at Mr. Houser's retirement and the editor's salary cut by degrees to \$3,500 (no house and no expense account). The three folks in the office took their cuts with the rest.

The work of the associate editor has been absorbed by the editor and the staff, so that there is a saving of over \$4,200 in the office alone.

Despite that saving, here are the figures we are compelled to give:

This does not take into account the amount still due from subscribers, which just about offsets what it will cost the Advocate to finish the year, 1934.

As an offset, we have a building, made with hands, free and clear. We would now be in it, but Central church's anxiety to keep us has made it cheaper to stay than to move, and our own building is rented.

This building is our tangible reserve against the future, but our real defense is an imponderable asset, the goodwill of over 500 Methodist preachers and the love of 10,000 Methodist families.

THE NEW PLANS

Following the suggestions of the Lansing Council the Advocate has started the plan of having a news-editor on every district and the D. S's have appointed splendid men to this worthwhile but difficult task.

Following the same lead, we are herewith submitted nominations for the eight contributing editors. We found this task as puzzling as making appointments, starting with twenty men we coveted and finally eliminating twelve of them: W. W. Whitehouse, W. E. Beckett, A. E. McCrea, S. B. Owens, Gordon Phillips, W. C. S. Pellowe, C. L. Calkins, W. P. Lovett.

MR. HOUSER'S DEATH

At the end of the year, on August 29, came the sudden death of Brother Elmer Houser, in his 86th year. Wonderful tributes have been paid to this consecrated layman who gave fifty-two years to the paper that he loved as he loved his own life.

It was some satisfaction to pass over to him every month, the pension that came in, the gifts of his friends of the Advocate. True, it was not a large amount, it will likely reach \$300 by the time the Conference returns are in, but in the midst of the depression, it proved that he was in our hearts.

By action of the board, the same plan of voluntary gifts will be followed next year, going now to Mrs. Houser.

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT
University of Michigan
December 7, 1933

A grant has been received from the Earhart Foundation to begin an experiment in Religious Education.

I. The University will seek to understand the problems of religion and to improve facilities for religious development of students. A Counselor in Religious Education has been appointed. He is Dr. Edward W. Blakeman.

II. In the beginning and central will be Dr. Blakeman's personal interview work. Dr. Blakeman will be available to the students as a counselor in the religious field.

III. The Counselor will also function as a contact officer between religious bodies and the University. He will further serve as adviser to the University in all matters having to do with the relation of religious organizations to the University.

IV. It is hoped that Dr. Blakeman will be able to correlate the efforts of campus ministers and thus bring religious agencies and the University closer together in the educational field.

For the present, Dr. Blakeman's office will be in Room 9, University Hall.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MORAL AND SOCIAL REFORM

Jesus gives to us an experience of personal salvation and the fruits of the spirit. He also gave unto us the great ideal of the Kingdom. The experience of personal religion and the building of the Kingdom is our two-fold task. The second of these is the aspect of our work to which this committee must give its attention.

We believe that only a great crusade can awaken the heroic in the breast of the Church and rekindle that sense of urgency and conquest without which it must continue to languish in weakness and indifference.

I. THE WAY OF SOCIAL JUSTICE

Thoughtful churchmen will no longer postpone the task of dealing prayerfully, realistically, experimentally with the ideals of the Gospel and the sins of our present economic order. Is a society just which affords luxury to a few and enforces poverty upon many? Is a society Christian which denies to millions the opportunity for the abundant life? Can a people intelligent enough to invent machines and devise an industrial system become Christian enough to master its own creation?

That in these days of tension and shifting values our church may "serve the present age" we propose:

1. That we examine our personal ethics and economic practices in the light of Jesus' ideals for the Kingdom; and if we find ourselves engaged in any practices which injure or destroy life we will sincerely repent of such actions.

2. That we recognize the benefits that have come to society out of our capitalistic order during a period of pioneering, exploration of new geographical areas, and under the conditions of a scarcity economy; nevertheless as Christians, facing new conditions wherein society has moved from pioneering and exploration, and scientific progress in industrial life has produced an economy of plenty, we will be compelled to adjust our ethics to the new conditions in the light of Jesus' teaching.

3. That we believe selfish competitive methods to be contrary to the spirit of Christ.

4. That we call sinful all practices which deny food, shelter, clothing, religion, education and the cultural values of any persons who are willing to work.

5. That we realize the inadequacy of the basic ethics of our present social system and work towards the achievement of a Christian Social Order in which human values will have primacy in all social relations.

6. That in our local communities we aid in the development of strong producers and buyers co-operatives.

7. That we declare that labor has the right to their own organizations and the right of collective bargaining with employers of labor.

II. THE WAY OF WORLD PEACE

The Christian attitude toward the problem of international relations is necessarily that of peace, friendship, brotherhood. Christian living is grounded in the world proclamation of Peace on earth, good will toward man.

That the peace sentiment of the Detroit Conference become focused and pointed for action we propose:

1. That we use Armistice Sunday and Memorial Day to further peace.
2. That we call upon members of our church to refuse to take military drill in college or high school R. O. T. C.'s, and to refrain from attending Citizen's Military Training Camps.
3. That the owning of stock in or bonds of such industrial concerns as profit in armaments be declared a sin; and that our members "shall continue to evidence their desire of salvation" by a refusal to make or to continue the ownership of such investments.
4. That members of local churches be urged to write their representatives and senators urging them to vote against appropriations for War armaments and in favor of peace programs.

We appreciate the earnest leadership of Bishop Blake in his effort to inform our people of the facts regarding the criminal practices of armament manufacturers, and in his forceful plea for farmers and laborers, as expressed in his recent "Michigan Christian Advocate" article. As a Conference we pledge to him our support in calling our people to repentance for these our besetting sins.

We believe that the present trend in the subject matter presented in moving pictures is highly detrimental to the spiritual welfare of society and therefore call upon all our people to refuse patronage to those who offer such detrimental programs. Also that we devote our lives to preaching and living such lives as will give a distaste for anything that tends to tear down the principles and teachings of Jesus Christ.

We commend the League of Decency and will co-operate with the Federal Council of Churches, and the Methodist Movement for Better Movies in their campaigns for genuine reform in the Motion Picture Industry.

APPORTIONMENTS TO THE CHARGES FOR THE CLAIMANTS

The apportionments for 1934-35 shall be twenty-five cents per full active member plus an amount equal to a percentage of the salary received, not including house rent, according to the following scale: Charges paying not more than \$1,000, 2%; not more than \$2,000, 3%; not more than \$3,000, 4%; not more than \$4,000, 5%; not more than \$5,000, 6%; not more than \$7,000, 7%; more than \$7,000, 8%. The per capita and percentage factors shall be figured upon the members reported and the salaries received during the Conference year 1933-1934. Charges having no parsonage will have but 87% of their cash salary figured in making the apportionment for such charges.

Any pastor who believes that the local conditions on his charge are so extraordinary that a reduction should be made, may appeal to his District Superintendent or to the Secretary of the Board of Stewards; but such an appeal must be made before August 1, 1935.

The Board of Stewards re-elected R. T. Kilpatrick as Chairman, F. B. Johnston, Treasurer, and F. D. Mumby, Secretary, for this year and they will constitute the Executive Committee of the Board. The Board also requested John E. Mealley to continue his work of tabulating the achievement records of all members of the Conference.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES

During the past year the Goodwill Industries have paid out in wages to needy and handicapped people, \$107,108.57 which is an increase over the year before of over \$33,000.

In addition to regular employment being given to 225 employees the year around, over 60 families were given employment for furniture.

In our outside employment department so far this year over 700 have been given work by the day. First day's wages on these jobs amounts to over \$3,000.

The Flint Goodwill Industries was organized in March, 1932, and is now operating a plant and two stores, employing from 10 to 14 people each week. The amount of sales the past year is \$5,577.05. Rev. G. F. Tripp has been the executive secretary from its first organization.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

We believe this Sesqui-Centennial year is a good time to rekindle the evangelistic passion in the minds of all our people. The need of our day is a spiritual revival which shall put God on the throne of our hearts and Jesus Christ as the Redeemer of every life.

THEREFORE: We suggest that following this conference session each District Superintendent hold an evangelistic conference, or group conferences, with his pastors to pray for a deeper Christian experience in their own hearts, and to study and plan the most effective means to win men to Jesus Christ and His way of life.

We suggest that each pastor have a special Communion Service with his official Board, or a retreat at some neighboring church, or selected place where he may pray with them and lay upon their hearts the imperative necessity of knowing afresh the Christ of God and leading others to Him.

We suggest that the Pastor and his Official Board seek to bring the membership of the church into a new dedication to Christ, and an active participation in the work of the Church. Among the features which should be emphasized are the revival of the family altar, the revival of personal testimony, the revival of church attendance, the rehabilitation of inactive members, the revival of friendly visitation for Christ. We suggest as methods of public evangelistic meetings:

1. The special revival meeting under the leadership of carefully chosen evangelists, or one of our pastors, the District Superintendent being consulted.
2. The co-operative evangelistic meeting, in which two, or three, or four pastors unite for a campaign in each of their churches.
3. Pastors exchanging with each other.
4. Pastors volunteering to help for a period of two weeks, some other pastor.
5. The preaching mission which has been so successfully carried out by Bishop Leonard.

We urge the use of the four-year programs offered by the General Conference Commission on Evangelism in all our churches as a wonderful aid in creating an evangelistic consciousness, and in leading many souls into the kingdom.

REPORT OF THE SESQUI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

The Sesqui-Centennial Committee appreciates the action of the Conference Program Committee in presenting to this Conference a splendid interpretation of the story of Methodism.

We recommend to our churches and minister the literature available from the Book Concern regarding the One Hundred and Fiftieth Anniversary of the Christmas Conference held at Baltimore, and the stirring story of the growth of this movement in the New World.

For the sake of unity in the observance of the Sesqui-Centennial Program throughout the Methodist Episcopal Church, it is recommended that our churches especially observe the Sundays set apart by the Commission on Evangelism.

Sunday, October 14th—NATION-WIDE METHODIST SESQUI-CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION SUNDAY.

Sunday, October 21st—ALDERSGATE SUNDAY, with Sermon on the significance of the Methodist Movement.

Sunday, October 28th—WORLD SERVICE SUNDAY, "THE WORLD IS MY PARISH."

Sunday, December 23rd or Tuesday, December 25th—SPECIAL CHRISTMAS COMMUNION SERVICE IN COMMEMORATION OF THE METHODIST CHRISTMAS CONFERENCE OF 1784.

Covenant Sunday, January 6th, 1935—The Covenant Service may be obtained from the Methodist Book Concern.

THE ALDERSGATE ROUND TABLE STUDY GROUPS WILL BE ORGANIZED throughout Methodism, following and inspired by the Sunday Aldersgate Service of October 21st. We commend to our churches the Pageants and Oratorio especially prepared for this celebration and recommend the presentation of these features in connection with the Christmas Programs of our churches.

The Methodist Book Concern has available in pamphlet form, literature containing an adequate bibliography for the Sesqui-Centennial and information concerning all the available accessories for the enrichment of the observance of the One Hundred and Fiftieth Anniversary of the organization of Methodism in America.

We recommend that following the Observance of these special days, and under the leadership of the District Superintendent, we enter into an evangelistic campaign culminating Easter Sunday, with the objective of a revival of pure and undefiled religion in every heart, every home and every church.

SUSTENTATION FUND

Report of the Distribution Committee, 1934

Although the Detroit Conference, after adopting the report of the Committee continuing the operation of the Sustentation Fund, saw fit to reverse its decision and substitute the Bishop's Plan of The Minimum Salary, it yet remained the duty of your Distribution Committee to allot the funds received at Conference time and to close up the account. On November 2, 1933, we distributed \$1,180.00 to 46 members of the Conference and four accepted Supplies. The amounts ranged from \$10.00 to \$45.00 and in nearly every case was gratefully acknowledged as being a great fraternal assistance. \$90.00 was distributed to four men on the Saginaw District; \$170.00 to six men of the Port Huron District; \$205.00 to ten men of the Marquette District; \$205 to eight men of the Flint District; \$250.00 to 11 men of the Ann Arbor District and \$260.00 to 11 men of the Detroit District.

Our gross receipts in this first year of operating the Sustentation Fund were \$1,527.19. The first distribution was made May 15, 1933 of \$296.00 (as reported at our last Conference session). In September an urgent case was aided with \$25.00. Our office expense of postage and paper was \$6.83. And in January 9, 1934 the balance of this fund (\$29.36) was "loaned to a necessitous case" presented by one of the Superintendents.

The Conference has no need to apologize for this our first adventure in bearing one another's burdens. The Sustentation Fund Plan has been superseded by the Minimum Salary Plan which will help fewer men but with larger amounts. The Sustentation Plan sought to exercise a just and careful discrimination based on a merit record in its allotment of funds. This made our work delicate, difficult and open to criticism from those who felt that they had been discriminated against. With the acceptance of this report we believe the Sustentation Fund Plan becomes a closed undertaking.

On Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock, the Conference was delightfully entertained by an organ recital by Miss Ethel Weale, organist of the Jefferson Avenue Church.

At 7:45, with Sidney Eva presiding, the assembly was led in worship, singing the hymn No. 543, "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind, Forgive Our Feverish Ways," after which Herbert B. Rhodes offered prayer. A ladies' quartette sang "Gracious Spirit" by Gounod. The chairman introduced H. Addis Leeson, who spoke on "Backgrounds of Michigan Methodism," making special mention of the work of the Detroit Conference Historical Society. The Mayor of Saginaw, the Honorable Robert C. Weber, was present and on behalf of the city extended a hearty welcome to the Conference. The Rev. Thornton B. Penfield, Jr., who spoke on behalf of the churches of the city extended to the Conference on their behalf a most gracious welcome.

The main address of the evening was given by the presiding Bishop, Adna W. Leonard, who presented the thrilling story in a masterful way of Jason Lee, pioneer Methodist Missionary in North West America.

The service was concluded by singing the hymn No. 540, "O Could I Speak the Matchless Worth" and the benediction was pronounced by George B. Thomas.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Anniversaries

The anniversary of the Woman's Home Missionary Society was held at 2 o'clock in the Congregational Church, with Mrs. Walter R. Fruit, presiding. John Edwards led in prayer. Mrs. C. F. Holmes, Corresponding Secretary of the Society brought a message of much help. The Anniversary Address entitled: "S. O. S." was delivered by Miss Muriel Day of Cincinnati.

At 3 o'clock, at the Congregational Church, the Anniversary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was observed. Mrs. Dunning Idle presided. An inspiring address was given by Miss Harriet L. Watson of China, on the subject: "He is not here."

At 4 o'clock, the second Sesqui-Centennial Address was given by M. S. Rice, with Hazen Werner presiding.

In characteristic manner, the speaker brought to the Conference a message of great inspiration, in which the Christian faith was depicted not only as a mighty force in history, but as a vitally necessary element in present life, and as the only hope of the future. The speaker based his remarks on the passage, 2 Corinthians, chapter 1, 10th verse, "Who delivered us from so great a death, and doth deliver: in whom we trust that he will yet deliver us."

The Conference Board of Education Dinner was held in the dining room of the Warren Avenue Presbyterian Church. The chairman, Peter F. Stair, presented the speaker of the occasion, Joseph M. M. Gray, Chancellor of American University, Washington, D. C., who delivered a timely address.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

At 4:30 o'clock, the Conference assembled for the third lecture in connection with the Sesqui-Centennial Celebration, with Arnold F. Runkel in the chair.

David Shugg led in singing the hymn No. 410, "Lord Speak to Me that I May Speak," after which the chairman offered prayer.

The lecture was given by Joseph M. M. Gray, the Chancellor of the American University, Washington, D. C., on the subject: "The Obligations of Our History." The speaker splendidly delineated the story of early American Methodism, referring especially to the Christmas Conference of 1784, which reveals the missionary passion and education interests of the pioneer Methodists, who speak with intense zeal out of their extremely hard and difficult day reminding us of our obligation to sustain what they so heroically began.

FRIDAY EVENING

The Conference Lecture: "Adolph Hitler and Europe Today" was delivered to a large gathering in the Saginaw City Auditorium, following a program of instrumental music by a String Ensemble.

At 8:45, the Chairman, the Rev. Albert Pellowe, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, Petoskey, introduced the lecturer, Frederick B. Fisher, who had just returned from a visit to Germany, speaking from his observation of the Hitler regime, and created an intense interest by his masterful portrayal of the political and social conditions growing out of the Nazi movement.

SATURDAY EVENING

At 7:30 o'clock, there was held in the Church Auditorium an Epworth League Rally of Institute songs. Mrs. Vera Wilcox, President of the Saginaw Bay District Epworth League presided. The Young People's Choir of the Jefferson Avenue Church, under the direction of Mrs. Edna Thompson contributed several numbers to the song service which was rendered to the delight of the Conference.

At 8 o'clock, the Anniversary Service of the Board of Temperance of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Gordon Phillips, the Chairman of the occasion, presented the speaker of the evening, Dr. Deets Picket, Research Secretary of the Board who spoke on "Where Now is Prohibition" which was an enlightening description of the liquor situation as it is found after the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

SUNDAY SERVICES

The Conference Love Feast was held at 9:30 A. M. and was directed by Dr. Charles H. Morgan. We record the key-note of the Love Feast Service of the

Sesqui-Centennial year: Experience holds the secret of Methodism's recovered power.

The morning Worship Service was conducted at 10:30 o'clock by the presiding Bishop, Adna Wright Leonard, assisted by some of the District Superintendents.

The choir beautifully rendered an anthem, "The Heavens are Telling."

Bishop Leonard preached the Conference sermon using as his text, 2 Corinthians 2:1-5, his subject being, "Life's Captives," in which Jesus Christ was depicted as the necessary force to control the moral and spiritual life of men to save it from the dangers arising from its own limitations and inadequacies.

SUNDAY EVENING

A Mass Meeting was held at the Saginaw City Auditorium at 7:30 o'clock, observing the Sesqui-Centennial of American Methodism.

A prelude to the meeting was a splendidly rendered program of instrumental musical numbers by the Saginaw Eddy Band, under the direction of its Conductor, Mr. Boos.

After the singing of Charles Wesley's well-known hymn, "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing," the Rev. A. J. Preston, President of the Saginaw Ministerial Association offered a prayer. The combined choirs of Saginaw rendered the anthem, "The Heavens Resound" by Beethoven. A very fitting part of the program was the reciting of the paragraph from John Wesley's writings in which he described his conversion in the meeting room of the Moravian Brethren, in Aldersgate Street, London, where his heart was "strangely warmed." Also appropriate to the occasion was the reading of Francis Asbury's resolve, when on his way to America to journey thither with the sole purpose "to live to God and bring others to do so." This resolve was read responsively, led by Clifford E. Doty.

The Rev. Edgar DeWitt Jones, D.D., minister of the Central Woodward Christian Church, Detroit, gave the address of the evening, "Storm Over the Churches," in which he described the various inadequate shelters many are seeking from the storm of present-day distress. Mysticism, Humanism, Buchmanism, Barthianism, and Ritualism, being described as ways of escape for individuals from the storm, while the masses are left to suffer the brunt of the adverse elements of our civilization. No great prophet or leader having appeared in this day of storm, the speaker pointed to the Wesleys and their stormy times, and indicated the need again of such men consecrated to God and the human cause.

VII.—MEMOIRS

ROBERT N. MULHOLLAND

Robert N. Mulholland was born near Trafalgar, Ontario, February 23, 1848. He grew up on a farm and from the discipline of farm work he learned what it meant to give a full day's work in the vineyard of his Lord. He was faithful to his task as a minister and a pastor and through his faithful labors many came to know and love the Lord that he loved and served.

He was educated in the public schools and in Adrian College. He joined the Detroit Conference in 1888, coming from the Methodist Protestant Conference. He served the following charges, Oscoda, Vassar, Morenci, Cass City, Mt. Clemens and Algonac.

In 1912 he retired, and moved to Waterville, Ohio. Mrs. Mulholland preceded him in death in 1922, one week after they had happily celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. The funeral service was from the Methodist Church at Waterville, Ohio, conducted by the pastor the Rev. Mr. Wagaman.

FREDERICK COATES

Frederick Coates was born in Holbeach Parish, Lincolnshire, England, December 6, 1846, and passed to his eternal home, November 25, 1933. He was a member of the class of "The Early Seventies," an alumni organization whose members now are few. Early in his Christian experience he felt a definite call to preach and was licensed a local preacher by the Grand Blanc quarterly Conference. In 1874, he joined the Detroit Conference preaching continuously for 43 years.

On August 1, 1875, he married Miss Carrie Spencer, a school teacher and a devoted Christian, remaining her companion for 58 years and she proved a great inspiration to him in his Christian ministry.

Frederick Coates had a great passion for souls. Revivals which brought results were held on every charge. The financial and spiritual interests of the kingdom came first in all his prayers and plans. For 16 years he remained on the retired list, continuing as a helpful and inspiring influence to all with whom he came in contact.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, November 28th, from his residence in Flint, with H. G. Werner in charge with interment in Evergreen Cemetery.

HARRY N. BIDDLECOMBE

Harry N. Biddlecombe was born in Redlynch, England, December 2, 1880. He began his preaching ministry while still a very young man. At the annual conference of 1909, he was appointed to a charge near the Soo, which he served for

one year. The next year he was appointed to Hermansville, where he met and married Miss Jessie Dahlem.

Together they enjoyed pastorates at Ortonville, Flat Rock, Warren Avenue, Saginaw, Wayne, Bad Axe and Epworth Church, River Rouge. For four years, 1925-29, Brother Biddlecombe was Field Secretary of the Methodist Educational Advance.

On Sunday morning, December 24, 1933, he preached a sermon "The Nativity" with much fervor and inspiration to his people, and was apparently in good health, but about 5 o'clock, the same evening, as he was putting the final touches to the altar decorations, preparatory to a vesper service, he suddenly passed on.

The funeral service was conducted by Bishop Edgar Blake, assisted by Walter R. Fruit, Edgar J. Warren, J. M. Gray, Peter F. Stair, James Chapman and S. H. Berry. Special request had been made that he be interred in the Huron Valley Cemetery, by the congregation of Flat Rock, where fellow ministers gently carried and laid his body.

THOS. B. McGEE

In the death of Thomas B. McGee, January 4, 1934, the earthly career of a truly good man, an upright and honored citizen, a devoted husband and father, a faithful minister of Jesus Christ, came to its close and the larger life and richer fellowships of the other world began for him.

Mr. McGee was born in England, March 25, 1850, the son of William McGee, a miller. A few years after his birth, the McGee family migrated to America and settled in Canada, where Thomas received his education in the public schools of Ontario and in Victoria College, near Toronto.

At the age of 27, he came to Michigan, and in 1879 began his work in the ministry as a probationer in the Detroit Annual Conference, his first appointment being Pinconning. For 36 years he received his regular appointments nearly all of which were in the lower part of the state.

In 1915, he was granted the retired relation in the Conference.

On December 15, 1876, a new home was begun when Thomas B. McGee and Mary M. Brown of Picton, Ontario, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown, took the solemn marriage vows to be faithfully kept for over a half century, the 57th anniversary of their marriage being observed in a quiet way, December 15, 1933.

Into this Christian home came four children, two sons and two daughters, to be given a warm welcome and a careful training in what makes for noble manhood and womanhood. Earl McGee, Mrs. Benjamin Priest, Ada McGee and Frank McGee, all of whom preceded their father in death leaving their widowed mother to continue her journey alone to the end of her day.

The funeral services were held in First Church, Owosso, on Saturday afternoon, January 6, the body lying in state for an hour before the services. Dr. Dunning Idle, Superintendent of Flint District, was in charge, assisted by John Meredith, pastor of the church, Hartley Cansfield of the Corunna Avenue Church, Owosso, George H. Curts, pastor at Howell, and R. T. Kilpatrick of Mt. Olivet Church, Dearborn. The six pall-bearers were chosen from the ministers on the district, to assist in the burial in Oak Hill Cemetery in Owosso.

SAMUEL W. BIRD

Samuel W. Bird was born in Algonac, October 19, 1853. He was the only son of Rev. and Mrs. Samuel Bird, and passed away December 27, 1934, at the home of his sister, Mrs. A. V. Leggett at North Branch, Mich., where he and Mrs. Bird were spending a few days over Christmas.

He received his education in Albion College, then united with the Detroit Conference, serving for 29 years in various charges in Eastern Michigan.

His last charge was Davisburg, where he built himself a home and spent his retired life.

In 1879, he was united in marriage to Miss Helen McClintack of Laingsburg.

The funeral services were held at Davisburg, where his body was laid to rest. Rev. Druning Idle D.D., District Superintendent of Flint District had charge and preached the sermon. The choir of the church sang. Several of the neighboring ministers took part in the services.

Rev. J. O. Spracklin, the pastor of the church spoke of the faithfulness of Rev. Bird and that he attended church to his very last days, though very feeble.

This dear brother was deeply spiritual and always inspirational. Christian service and devotion and brotherly love were stressed in his ministry.

He leaves to mourn his loss, his widow, Mrs. S. W. Bird; a son, Ray H. Bird of Santa Monica, Calif.; a daughter, Clara H. Bird of Detroit; a sister, Mrs. A. V. Leggett of North Branch, Mich.; and a niece, Miss Myra Snow also of North Branch, Mich.

HENRY ROGERS

Henry Rogers was born in Cornwall, England, November 6, 1871; died at Mohawk, Mich., January 9, 1934, having suffered but a day or two. Both ministers and laymen of the Upper Peninsula, where he spent his entire ministry, feel keenly the loss of this inspiring spirit.

Henry Rogers was converted and united with the Wesleyan Church in England at the age of 19. In 1896, he came to the United States and united with our church at Ishpeming, from which he went forth to serve (Newport) Ironwood. Then two years at Albion College after which he served Hurontown, Rockland, Baltic, Painsdale, Pewabic, Bessemer, Salisbury and Mohawk. Brother Rogers had the splendid memory of being ordained at the altar where he united with American Methodism.

Brother Rogers unselfish ministry endeared him to all men. To preach Jesus Christ in word and deed was his one task and he did it well. The funeral was held at Mohawk on January 11th, his Supt. Rev. Joseph Dutton in charge. Many of his brethren took part in the service. His own choir furnished the music and the body is at rest in the beautiful cemetery at Houghton. We can best remember him by being true to the great ideals for which he lived and died. He loved God—he loved man.

LEVI BIRD

Levi Bird, retired member of the Detroit Conference, died at his home in Bellevue, Ohio, after a brief illness, Sunday, February 11, 1934.

Funeral services were held Monday in the family home, and were conducted by Rev. C. R. McMeeken, pastor of the Methodist Church of Bellevue, and Rev. C. H. Rundt, of the Evangelical Church. The final service was held in the First Methodist Church of Ripley, N. Y., where the interment took place. Rev. Ames Maywood, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Jamestown, N. Y., paid high tribute to the indomitable spirit of this veteran preacher of the gospel, speaking from the Word found in II Samuel 3:39, "And the king said unto his servants, Know ye not that there is a Prince and a Great Man fallen this day in Israel."

Born in Walsoll, England, in 1857, Dr. Bird had nearly completed his 77th year. When he was eight years of age, his father, a pioneer Methodist minister, brought his family to the United States and settled in Freeland, Pa.

Choosing in early life to enter the Christian ministry, he set about securing an education in Park College, Parkville, Pa., Cazenovia Seminary, and finally in Allegheny College, from which he received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. Upon graduating from Cazenovia, he was presented as one who had enrolled in the seminary with 10 cents as his entire financial resources, and who had "worked harder and made greater sacrifices" in attaining his education than any other graduate of the institution.

In the fall of 1883, he entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, serving his initial pastorate in Auburn, N. Y. He later transferred to the Erie Conference, and, about 25 years ago, to the Detroit Conference, in which he remained active until his retirement in the fall of 1923.

Always an ardent fighter in the cause of prohibition, he played an active part, as official representative of the Anti-Saloon League, in the campaign which resulted in the adoption of the Prohibition Amendment in the Ohio Constitution.

In his fidelity to duty, in his uncompromising passion for righteousness, he was like a prophet of the Old Testament. And the life of a prophet is never an easy one. It means deprivations. It means sacrificial. It means misunderstandings. It was characteristic of the rigorous demands he made upon himself that having, at the age of 17, pledged himself to be present at the weekly prayer meetings, he kept the vow, without the lapse of a single service, during the 60 remaining years of his life.

On September 13, 1888, he was united in marriage at Conneaut Lake, Pa., to Miss Mary Crouch, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Crouch of the Erie Conference. He is survived by his widow and two sons, John Wendell, an attorney in Lansing, Mich., and Charles Wesley, associate professor of languages and literature in the California State Teachers' College in Fresno, Calif.

ROLAND WOODHAMS

Roland Woodhams was born on May 19, 1845, in Sussex County, England. Five years later his parents settled in Wayne County, New York. Roland was a worker, earning wages during the summer months and studying through the

winter. By this method he was able at the age of 23 to present himself for the Freshman class in the Michigan University in the fall of 1868. During his junior year he dedicated himself to God and the ministry. In the year 1872 he finished his course in the university, married the Christian woman of his choice, who for many years was his devoted helper in the cause he loved. He united with the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, remaining a faithful minister until his retirement in 1908. He possessed a beautiful and Christ-like spirit. He was a faithful brother and a true friend.

After he became District Superintendent he carried with him that same spirit of brotherly kindness, coupled with an evangelistic urge. He inaugurated an annual district rally when for four or five days those ministers over whom he had charge met for the special purpose of heart searchings in light of the scriptures. Those were truly seasons of gracious blessings. His leadership blessed the following charges: Caseville, Winona, Vassar, Grass Lake, Oscoda, Alpena, South Bay City, Bay City District, Lapeer, Caro and Corunna.

He was laid to rest at Ann Arbor, February 15, 1934, Dr. Stanley Coors and Peter F. Stair, George Wright and Marshall Reed participating in the services.

JOSIAH R. RANKIN

Josiah Reed Rankin, a retired minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church and widely known Civil war veteran, died April 14, 1934 in his 87th year. He was born November 10, 1847. At the age of 16 he entered the Civil war, serving under Captain Moffett's command; was taken prisoner but was later honorably discharged.

In 1889, he was ordained as a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church and became a member of the Erie Conference, where he served over a long period of years. Among his pastorates were Cambridge Springs, Corry, Sharon and Dunkirk, New York.

He also served as District Superintendent of the Jamestown, New York District from which he was later transferred to hold membership in the Detroit Conference. His last charge was at Houghton. Harriman University conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1910.

Funeral services were in charge of Rev. H. A. Baun, Pastor, assisted by Dr. T. R. Courtice of the First Methodist Church, McKeesport. Burial was beside his wife, in Forest Lawn Mausoleum at Glendale, Calif. Many beautiful tributes were paid to this consistent and faithful preacher of the gospel.

R. R. BRYAN

Dr. Bryan was born January 10, 1858 at Marion, Ohio. He received his education at Ohio Northern University and at Drew Seminary. In 1879, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary E. Wolfley of Ada, Ohio. He gave nearly 50 years to the ministry, serving with great acceptability important charges both

in Indiana and in the Detroit Conference. He is survived by his companion, one son, Roy Bryan and one grandson.

Funeral services were held in Grace Church, Franklin, Ind., May 8, 1934. The Rev. E. E. Aldrich, the Rev. Dr. H. C. Clippinger, the Rev. Dr. Hartinger and the Rev. W. S. Rader took part in paying a glowing tribute to this noble man of God. Twenty-one brother ministers gathered about the casket and sang, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," while his body was laid to rest in Greenlawn Cemetery, Franklin, Ind. He walked with God; he gave a good account of his stewardship; and he witnessed for His Master.

CHARLES J. JOHNSON

Charles John Johnson was born in Terondjam, Norway, on April 11, 1873, and closed his earthly life, after about two months of protracted suffering, in Rialto, Calif., May 10, 1934.

For 30 years he served pastoral charges; although only 23 of them were while he technically held an "active" relation. Fifteen years of his preaching were to Norwegian-Danish congregations; 10 were in Detroit Conference, five at Munising and five at Marquette. In both of these cities he was much interested in boys and young men, and in general public movements.

At Munising he accepted the duties of Scout Master for the Boy Scouts. During one of his years, at Marquette, he spent his summer vacation at Plattsburg, N. Y., that he might be with the young men in their camp. After his pastorate in Marquette, he was subsidized for two years, that he might do research work and write a history of Marquette and its surrounding territory. For better climatic conditions for his wife, he went to Southern California, and served as pastor for five years at Azusa.

Brother Johnson's preaching was of high standard and broad range. His reading was multifarious, and his command of literary allusions and opposite quotations was unusual in number and beauty. He was a man of independent thinking and independent action. Such men are always a little difficult to accustom to the routine circle, but they are grand to know, and they are signally inspirational to lofty plans of thinking.

Brother Johnson's last contribution to the enrichment of the church was "The Beginnings of Methodism in the Lake Superior Region," which first appeared in the Michigan Christian Advocate in 11 serial numbers, and which afterwards was published by the Advocate in a very attractive booklet. The close of this thesis is a fitting conclusion of the life story of its author, as the final expression of the faith of his soul. It might well be his own epitaph.

The funeral services were held at Forest Lawn Chapel in Glendale.

Besides the relatives there were present, a goodly company of friends, among them a number from Munising and Marquette. One of these, John Bergen, who formerly was his church organist, officiated at the organ. Two solos, "Haven of Rest" and "Home of the Soul" were effectively sung by Miss Esther Dalton, daughter of Rev. C. B. Dalton, pastor at Alhambra. Rev. Paul F. Huebner, pastor of the M. E. Church at Lynwood, offered a spiritual prayer.

Rev. O. W. Willits of the Detroit Conference read the obituary and briefly preached from Paul's "Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness."

CLARENCE EARL HOON

Clarence Earl Hoon, was born in West Middleton, Ind., on October 31, 1880. His father and his paternal grandfather were both ministers of the Gospel, and keeping the line unbroken, he was ordained in the Methodist ministry in 1897, at the early age of 16 years. His early pastorates were in Illinois. Later he served several churches in Iowa, among them, First Church, Sioux City, where he held an extended pastorate. He was then called to Hyde Park Church in Cincinnati, during which ministry he built the present magnificent Hyde Park Temple. He left Hyde Park in July, 1929, to accept a call to the First Methodist Church in Seattle, Wash., the fourth largest Methodist Church in the world. He served this church two years. In 1932, when in a period of emergency, Nardin Park Church sought widely for a minister, Dr. Hoon was brought from Seattle to Detroit to assume this most important and strategic pastorate. On the first Sunday of May, 1932—May 1st, he began his ministry in this great church, the second largest Methodist congregation in the city.

However, in the dispensation of an inscrutable yet all-seeing Providence, his pastorate at Nardin Park was destined to be only a brief one. On Wednesday evening, September 5th, after returning home from a beautiful and happy prayer service, he was suddenly stricken with a severe heart attack resulting from a blood clot in one of the blood vessels of the heart. He was taken to Ford Hospital and for 18 days hovered between life and death. Everything that medical skill could do was done to save him. The prayers of his loved ones, his friends the country over, and the devoted people of his church constantly ascended in earnest and heart-felt supplication for his recovery. Nevertheless, it seemed to be the will of an all-wise Heavenly Father that he should go Home, and on the evening of Friday, September 21st, he slipped away to be "Forever with His Lord."

Loved ones surviving him are his wife, Mrs. Fannie Ruth Hoon; his son, Paul Waitman; his daughter, Bessie Evelynola; his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Hoon of Kokomo, Ind.; his two brothers, Rev. Ernest Hoon of Garner, Iowa; and Rev. John Hoon of Lynn, Mass.; and his sister, Mrs. Hester Harper of Woodriver, Nebraska.

The funeral services were held in the chapel of Nardin Park on Friday afternoon, October 5, 1934, under the direction of Bishop Edgar Blake, assisted by M. S. Rice, Walter R. Fruit and Lloyd Moffett. Clarence Earl Hoon's body rests in the beautiful Grand Lawn Cemetery, Detroit, Mich.

MRS. PHENA MASON WILLITS

Miss Phena Mason was born at Chesening, Mich., July 4, 1874. She was converted in her 16th year and united with the Methodist church. She matured into unusual perfect womanhood. Truth, purity and moral courage were her outstanding characteristics.

On October 10, 1896, she was married to Rev. O. W. Willits. She was well prepared by her missionary zeal, her vows which she held most sacred and her consecration to be a minister's helpmate at home and abroad. She spent eight very useful years with her husband in Northern China. No record has been kept save by Him who keepeth all; but her ministrations both in America and China are a vast number. Her life was indeed a blessing to many people and many lands.

Sister Willits ended her earthly pilgrimage at Alhambra, Calif., Sept. 11, 1933. In her last fully conscious moments she repeated the Twenty-third Psalm closing "And I will dwell in the House of the Lord forever." The funeral service was conducted at the Marengo Avenue Church, her pastor, Charles B. Dalto officiating. Burial was in San Gabriel Cemetery.

MRS. GEORGE ELLIOTT

Anna Margaret Corfield was born in Philadelphia, October 25, 1850. She was educated at Notre Dame Academy at Glenwood, Iowa and at Oakland, Calif. She was married to George Elliott, November 12, 1875. Four children were born to them.

Mrs. Elliott was of a retiring nature, but always the true helpmate, sustaining and cheering her husband through more than fifty years of arduous labor for their Lord and Master. Their home life was very beautiful, each helping and sustaining the other. Dr. Elliott often preached his new sermons to his wife in a self-imposed censorship. Dr. Elliott preceded Mrs. Elliott in death, passing on Sunday, November 2, 1930.

Mrs. Elliott shared with Dr. Elliott his Iowa pastorates of Cresco, Lansing, West Mitchell, Council Bluffs, and then the larger pastorates of Baltimore, Washington and Central Detroit. She was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage on September 21st, following the session of the annual Conference and passed on September 27, 1933. The funeral service was conducted by her pastor, J. M. M. Gray and she was laid to rest beside her husband in Roaseland Park Cemetery.

SUSAN RUMSAY KILPATRICK

Susan Rosantha Rumsay was born in Ohio, August 2, 1851. She came from the large family of John and Eliza Rumsay, and was the last living member of her family.

Susan was married, August 28, Trenton, Mich., to Rev. James Kilpatrick, who preceded her 28 years ago. She died November 9, 1933, at the home of her nephew, Harvard L. Baxter, Wyandotte, Mich., with whom she lived.

Sister Kilpatrick was a fine cultured woman, greatly loved where they served in the Conference. Preacher boys who roomed with her while at Albion speak of her as a kindly, gracious soul. Burial was at Howell.

MRS. KATHRINE BUDDENBAUM

Mrs. Kathrine Buddenbaum (nee Linder), died Saturday, January 13, 1934 at her home in Bay City, Mich. She was born in Germany, February 26, 1850; came to America at the age of four years; lost her father soon thereafter and with her mother settled in Bay City in 1856. Her mother was the first charter member of the Van Buren Street, M. E. Church in Bay City. In 1867, she was married to Rev. Henry Buddenbaum. Six children were born to them. Because of ill health, her husband was caused to superannuate. In the next few years she buried her mother, four sons, a daughter and her husband. Her daughter, Kathrine later married Rev. Louis Katterhenry, also a member of the Central German Conference, and on his death in an accident in 1925, settled with her mother in Bay City. Her pastor, Rev. Paul W. Plueddemann preached the funeral sermon from Matt. 25, 21 and Rev. Carl Pattow spoke, representing the Saginaw Bay Group of Methodist ministers. She leaves besides her daughter, three granddaughters and four greatgranddaughters.

MRS. JOANNA WIGLE

Mrs. Joanna Wigle, widow of the late Rev. Lemuel Wigle, died January 24, 1934 in Niagara Falls, N. Y., aged 77 years. She was born in 1857, near Thamesville, Essex County, Ontario, which was at that time densely wooded and not far removed from pioneer conditions.

The passing of Mrs. Wigle, who served as a minister's wife, from 1886 to 1901 in the northern districts of Detroit Conference, recalls to the mind, the strenuous labors connected with the rural Christian ministry in those times, helping to build the foundations for the church of today.

Rev. Lemuel Wigle died in 1901 and Mrs. Wigle's activities necessarily were concentrated upon the problems of raising her four small children, who survive her. They are Clarence L., Mazie F., Charles Ray, all of Niagara Falls, N. Y., and E. George, of the U. S. Coast Guard, stationed at New York. She is also survived by 11 grandchildren.

The remains were returned to Kingsville, Ontario, for burial. Rev. Sylvanus S. Davies conducted the funeral services.

MRS. ALFONSO CRANE

Eunice Elizabeth Sprout, daughter of Rowley and Polly Hinchey Sprout, was born April 1, 1850, and died March 1, 1934, after a month's severe illness.

She grew to womanhood in her father's home at Anderson, Mich., spending some years as teacher in the rural schools. She was married March 6, 1877, to Rev. Alfonso Crane and for 26 years shared with him the varied experiences of a parsonage life.

After her husband's death in 1903, Mrs. Crane and her son George, returned to the old home at Anderson, and lived there until 1922, when she came to make

her home with her daughter in Romeo. In early life she was converted and united with the Methodist Church at Pinckney, Livingston County, this membership being transferred to the Romeo Church in 1920. She was the last surviving member of a family of 10 children.

Mrs. Crane was the mother of five children, two of whom survive to mourn her loss, George A. Crane of Detroit; and Mrs. Ella Cuffman, of Romeo; also a grandson, Willard Bernarr Cuffman, of Romeo.

Funeral services were held Saturday from the Swarthout funeral home in Pinckney, Rev. A. T. F. Butt, of Romeo, officiating, assisted by Rev. C. L. Adams and Rev. G. H. Curts of Howell, and Rev. A. T. Camburn of Webberville. Interment was made in Sprout Cemetery at Anderson.

JOSHUA AND HARRIET THORNTON STANSFIELD

Wednesday, November 8, 1933, was a day of tragedy, bringing to a close the brilliant career of Joshua and Harriet Thornton Stansfield. Skidding on the icy pavement of U. S. 12, near Chelsea, Mich., while enroute to Chicago, their car collided with an eastbound motorbus. Mrs. Stansfield died instantly, Dr. Stansfield succumbed to his injuries a few days later without regaining consciousness.

The background of these remarkable personalities is that of two English homes of the middle class, traditionally Methodist in spirit and practice. Their birthplace was Idle, near Bradford, Yorkshire. Both participants in the activities of the circuit which included their home town, as young people, Joshua and Harriet Thornton were attracted to each other by the very dissimilarities of their pronounced individuality. They were married in Bingley Parish Church, Yorkshire, November 7, 1880.

The summer of 1887 found him afloat for America. He presented himself in September and was received as a probationer in Detroit Conference, and appointed to Wyandotte. Mrs. Stansfield and their two children, Mary, now Mrs. James L. Gardiner of Chicago, and Arthur, soon joined him.

From Wyandotte the course of their ministry leads through First Church, Port Huron, Mary Palmer Church, Detroit to Madison Avenue Church, Bay City. From this pastorate, in succession to the late Bishop William A. Quayle, they were transferred to Meridian Street Church, Indianapolis, Ind., for a service of 15 glorious years.

The long pastorate in Indianapolis was followed by five years of fruitful ministry in First Church, Portland, Oregon. Returning east, Hyde Park and Oak Park, in Rock River Conference, Illinois, claimed Dr. and Mrs. Stansfield for a further five years, a fitting climax of a great ministry.

Rock River Conference granted the retired relation in 1926. The Stansfields then came to their charming little estate, "Idlethorpe," on the St. Clair River, just north of the city of St. Clair. Here the summers of seven beautiful years were spent, their home being the Mecca for numerous friends of their active ministry. The winters found them happily sojourning with long-time friends in California or Florida. For a brief time Dr. Stansfield was interim pastor at Nardin Park Church, Detroit.

One senses that, great as his service was, it was a shared ministry. It could not have been all it was without the radiant personality of Harriet Thornton Stansfield. Her eager interest in all phases of churchly service; her "at-homeness" at his side in the drawing rooms of the socially distinguished and cultured and equally so in the homes of the humble and lowly; her droll humor which kept her guests in a constant outburst of mirth; her tender sympathy; her motherly interest in children and young people never failed.

Funeral services for Mrs. Stansfield were held in First Church, Port Huron, November 11th. John E. Martin presided, assisted by minister friends of the family. George B. Marsh gave the address. Friday, November 17th, found the great company reassembled for the funeral of Dr. Stansfield. Dr. Martin again presided, District Supt. Frank M. Field read the Scriptures, George B. Marsh offered prayer, Hartley Cansfield, life-long friend, A. B. Woodward, of Meridian Street Church, offered tribute. John Thompson hurried from his great work at Chicago Temple to speak in tender eulogy of his first and dearest friend in America. Side by side Dr. and Mrs. Stansfield rest in Lakeside Cemetery, Port Huron. There is no shadow here. They are forever with their Lord.

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ALICE B. SHIREY

Alice B. Shirey was born in Odessa, Pa., November 28, 1868, died at Detroit, February 5, 1934. Miss Shirey joined the staff of Central Church in 1901, remaining there for 10 months. In 1906 she returned to her duties there, and since that time has been a worker among the needy and the foreign-born, especially the Chinese.

In 1915 she started a Sunday School Class for the Chinese population. Seven men and women attended the first meeting. The Class grew until 1929, when it became a Mission. It was due mostly to her activities that a Chinese Clergyman is now a member of the staff of Central Church.

Hospitals were another field of her activities and it is largely due to her efforts that the Detroit Tuberculosis Sanatorium was instituted. The funeral was held in Central Church and the body lay in state from 4 to 7, the hour of the service. District Supt. Walter Fruit assisted by Guy Smith and Associate Pastor Ira Black, conducted the services. The pallbearers were former associate pastors of Central. Burial was at Clearfield, Pa.

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A. B. JONES

Brother A. B. Jones was a most acceptable supply preacher. Bishop Henderson "discovered" him in one of Detroit's clanging machine shops. Jones was not hard to find, however, for he quickly showed talents in leadership no matter where he might be. He soon became a very acceptable preacher and pastor. His ability to to exhort and encourage his listeners was very marked. It was an inspiration to hear him. His enthusiasm and zeal easily became contagious. In his contacts with the youth he soon won them to the way of life. Inspirational efforts were

easy and natural for him for he himself went about his tasks as one inspired. In his address to men, enthusiasm soon ran high. Laboring groups easily understood him, for he knew their problems, and they in turn appreciated his attitude. Brotherliness and Christian personality were his outstanding virtues. Genuine sorrow filled the hearts of the entire countryside when he was summoned home to God. He still speaks.

CLAUDIUS B. SPENCER

Dr. Spencer was born in Fowlerville, Mich., October 20, 1856. He was admitted into the Detroit Conference in 1881. He first served in the upper peninsula, among miners and lumbermen. After serving two pastorates in Detroit and one at Owosso, he was transferred to the Colorado Conference in 1892 to Christ Church. He edited the Rocky Mountain Christian Advocate for eight years and in 1900 was elected editor of "The Central," serving until his retirement in 1932.

He graduated from Northwestern University in 1881 and his later scholastic honors formed a remarkable list. He was a member of the General Conference in 1908 and 1912. He was secretary of the group, which organized the Epworth League on May 15, 1889.

Dr. Spencer on October 20, 1886, at Brookport, N. Y., was married to Mary L. Mitchell. Three daughters were born, Helen Mitchell, Marjorie Elizabeth and Mildred Isabel. The home life was exceptionally beautiful. Mrs. Spencer and Mildred, now Mrs. Roper of California, were present at the funeral services. Marjorie, now Mrs. Frank of South Bend, Ind., and Helen, now a high school teacher, were traveling in Europe.

The death of Dr. Spencer was caused by a complication of diseases. He had attended the recent session of the Colorado Conference at Pine Crest near Palmer Lake and later visited at Ft. Lupton. When he returned home he was quite ill and died at noon, Saturday, July 14th.

The body was taken to Howell, Mich., where burial services were held on Thursday, July 19th.

ELMER HOUSER

Few men have been held in such high esteem as Elmer Houser. He was a man after God's own heart, faithful in his service to God and faithful in service to his fellow men. One of his friends has said of him, that faithfulness should have been his second name.

Any task that he undertook was well done, he was always a builder. Others might tear things down, but it was always a joy for Elmer Houser to build. And how well he did it. His faith in God was so sure that he had a steady influence upon all those with whom he came in contact. As a writer he has been seldom surpassed in clearness of thinking, conciseness in words and fecundity of thought.

For 52 years he gave the best that he had to the Michigan Christian Advocate and for long years those who knew him best will remember this quiet, gentle, strong man of God.

After he relinquished his place on the "Advocate," he did not stop, but in the quietness of his beautiful home life he continued, in the presence of life-long companion, to read, to think and to write, while enjoying a well-earned rest. On August 29, 1934 his Lord called to him to come home.

PART X.—MISCELLANEOUS

A. PLAN OF CONFERENCE EXAMINATIONS

(A) UNDERGRADUATE COURSES.

(1) INSTRUCTORS.

(a) Within fifteen days after the close of each annual Conference each Instructor shall be furnished by the Registrar of his Board of Ministerial Training with the names and addresses of all students in each subject for which such Instructor is responsible. The subjects in which names shall be furnished shall include collateral reading, written sermon, and special homiletical work as well as studies for examination.

(b) Each instructor shall pursue diligently, and with regularity and promptness, the correspondence method in the conduct of "required written work." To this end the Instructor shall divide the required written work in each book or subject into from four to eight approximately equal parts as the subject may require. These assignments of work shall be sent to the students all at once before October 15th, or one month before the period assigned in the Registrar's letter. Each Instructor shall return promptly to the student each installment of written work, when postage is enclosed, giving criticisms, corrections, suggestions, and grades.

(c) Each instructor shall forward all grades on "required written work" to the Registrar of the Undergraduate School of Theology at Albion in time for the opening day of said school. Such report shall include also the status of the written work of students whose work is incomplete or entirely delinquent. Written work received after the conclusion of the Summer School of Ministerial Training shall be reported to the Registrar of the Board of Ministerial Training as early as possible and not later than the opening day of Conference.

(d) Each instructor shall, unless excused by the Chairman for unavoidable reasons, be present at the seat of the annual Conference on Tuesday of Conference week at 2:00 P. M., and shall conduct the examination in his own subjects. He shall also meet for counsel the classes of the ensuing year in each subject for which he is responsible. The schedule of examination and of periods for counsel shall be arranged by the Chairman and Registrar.

(e) Each member of the Board of Ministerial Training shall, unless excused by the Summer School Senate, serve as Instructor on the Undergraduate Summer School Faculty two years out of the Quadrennium, and preferably two consecutive years, the days of such service to be arranged by the Summer School Senate or a committee appointed by such Senate.

(f) The registrar will furnish each instructor a report blank on which the instructor shall enter all grades earned by students in his department and returned to the registrar not later than September 5.

(2) STUDENTS.

(a) Students will find necessary information on many points in the Chapter of Courses of study in the Discipline of 1932.

(b) Each student shall prepare and send in his "required written work," as indicated by his respective Instructors. Written work in all subjects requiring examination must be completed before the opening of the Summer School. Promptness in submitting required written work will count to the student's credit to such extent as the Instructor may deem fair and just. If for any reason the Instructor fails to get the requirements

in written work, or any part of the same, to the student within four weeks after due, as per section (b) under the head of "Instructors," the student shall prepare such required written work or part thereof as outlined in "Directions and Helps." It is expected by the Board that the required work in the studies for examinations, the collateral books, and the special homiletics be carried on simultaneously.

(c) Every student, unless excused as hereafter provided, is required to be at the Undergraduate Summer School of Theology at Albion each year during his Course of Study. Excuse for non-attendance shall require the concurrent action of the Dean of the School and of the Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training. This shall be understood to apply to all Undergraduates including those who are students of college or Theological Seminary. In case of necessary absence from the Summer School, the Instructor shall endeavor as best he can to make up to the student his loss by assigning extra work, giving additional examination, or both. Each student attending the Summer School shall receive his equitable share of the funds provided by the Conference for the support of the school, distribution being on the basis provided for by the Summer School Senate.

(d) Examination of all students shall be as follows: Examinations in all studies shall be taken only at the close of the Summer School of Ministerial Training, and on Tuesday of Conference week. Each student attending the Summer School shall be examined by his Instructors on the School Faculty rather than by the Board of Ministerial Training. Such Instructors may allow oral examination or recitations to supplement written examinations but these shall not be substituted for "required written work." Written or final examinations cannot be taken in any study until all the "required written work" in such study has been completed and is in the hands of the regular Examiner or Summer School Instructor. All "required written work" shall be graded by the Examiner and not by the Summer School Instructor.

(e) All written work not considered in section (2) paragraph (b) must be in the hands of the instructor not later than September 1, if the student wishes recognition for the same at the Conference session. Any work presented later will not receive credit until the following year.

(f) The student's final grade in any subject requiring examination, whether taken at the Summer School or at Conference, shall be arrived at as follows: The "required written work" will be graded on the basis of 100 per cent. as will also the examinations. For those not at the Summer School, extra tasks shall for the purpose of grading be regarded as "required written work," and additional examination shall be averaged with regular examination. The average of the marks on "required written work" and on examinations will be the final passing mark, providing that neither is below 70 per cent. The student's grade on all collateral subjects will be on the basis of 100 per cent, the minimum passing mark being 70 per cent.

(g) Each student shall pay annually, at the time of the Summer School of Theology, a fee of \$2.50, said fee to be divided on the basis of \$2.00 for the Summer School and 50 cents for the Board of Examiners. Absence from the Summer School does not excuse any student from paying the entire fee unless excused from studies by vote of the Conference.

(h) The work as offered at the Summer School in studies of the Admission Year shall be open, without financial aid, to supplies and other persons desiring to take same who do not expect to enter Conference. Written recommendation of the District Superintendent shall be the condition of enrollment in all such cases. Local preachers desiring to take the Local Preacher's course should consult the Chairman of the Board of Examiners concerning such course, and the possibility of substituting for at least a part of the same work offered in the Summer School. All persons taking Admission Studies in the Summer School who are to join the Conference at its next session and all Local Preachers regularly enrolled in the Local Course, shall share in the Conference financial aid on the same basis as Conference men.

(i) All substitutions desired by the student for work done in an educational institution or elsewhere shall be determined upon by the Board of Examiners, or by the Faculty of the Summer School in committee or as a whole, when either is in session.

When neither Board nor Summer School is in session, full power in the matter of substitutions requiring prompt decision shall be vested in the Chairman of the Board. No credits shall be accepted from any source unless signed by the official head or registrar of the institution in which the work has been done .

(j) In order that the Board of Ministerial Training may have better knowledge of the status, whereabouts and purposes of our undergraduates, it will be required of each member of the class, that he write to the Chairman of this Board thirty days prior to the meeting of the Annual Conference, a letter containing the following data:

First—Occupation during the year, whether at school, and if so where, and grades, whether in a pastorate or in secular employment. Second—What credits will be expected this year. Third—What his plans are for the following year. Failing to write such a letter, the undergraduate's name shall be included in a list of delinquents to be reported to Conference and published in the Conference Minutes.

(3) Applicants for Admission on Trial and into Full Membership from other denominations cannot be received if over thirty-five years of age except under the special rule covering their cases.

(4) ASSIGNMENT OF STUDIES.

(Note: The studies as given below are arranged by Departments. The year in which each comes is given by the figure in front of the study. Collateral work, that is, studies in which written work only and not examinations is required, is indicated by the letter C before the figure. The use of "Directions and Helps" for each year of Conference studies is required, as is the special Homiletical work therein indicated.)

(b) Pay registration fee to Dr. Allan MacRossie, Educational Director, 150 Fifth Ave., New York, or to Harry A. Brewer, Conference Registrar. If unit is not completed within one year from date of enrollment \$1.00 additional fee must be paid.

(c) Written work is to be done under the direction of an expert selected by the General Conference Commission on Courses of Study. The plan is given in detail in "Directions and Helps for Postgraduate Study." (Book Concern.)

(d) For each course or unit that is completed a certificate will be furnished. Upon the satisfactory completion of five of these Courses or Units a diploma will be granted, issued and signed by the General Conference Commission.

(e) Courses or Units of study are in process of preparation that will ultimately be made to cover many fields of vital interest. The following courses are prepared:

- I. "Studies in the Johannine Writings."
- II. "A Study of Jeremiah."
- III. "Modern Thought in Its Bearing on Religion."
- IV. "The Person and Work of Jesus Christ."
- V. "The Religion and Theology of Paul."
- VI. "Philosophy of Religion."
- VII. "World Trends and Christian Forces."
- VIII. "The Holy Spirit in Christian Life and Thought."
- IX. "The Meaning of God."
- X. "Worship Values in the Psalms."
- XI. "Re-Thinking Missions."
- XII. "The Minister's Leadership in Religious Education."
- XIII. "The Makers of American Christianity."
- XIV. "Homiletics."
- XV. "Christianity and the Social Order."
- XVI. "The First Three Gospels."

Our Graduate School for the Detroit Area is vitally connected with these Courses of Study, which should be taken up very early in the year; but the School is also made to cover a wide range of general subjects of compelling interest, thus making attendance possible and profitable for those who have been unable to pursue the studies throughout the year.

(2) ANNUAL SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION FOR MINISTERS.

(a) THE UNDERGRADUATE SUMMER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY.

The Undergraduate Summer School of Theology for the Michigan and Detroit Conferences meets annually at Albion, Michigan. School opens June 4, 1935.

All subjects in the Undergraduate Conference Courses of Study are taught, including Admission studies. Courses of special lectures are also given.

Attendance of all Undergraduates is required by Conference action.

(b) THE GRADUATE SUMMER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY.

The graduate Summer School of Theology also meets annually at Albion, Michigan. School will open June 11, 1935.

Courses of Postgraduate study offered by the General Conference Commission on Courses of Study are taught, and a strong educational program of class studies and lectures is offered.

This School is open to all preachers of the Area who have completed the Conference Studies leading to ordination of Elders. Work throughout the year in Graduate Study is advised, but is not a condition of attendance upon the Graduate Summer School of Theology.

(c) **THE SUMMER SCHOOL SENATE.**

The Summer School Senate is the organization responsible for these two Schools of Ministerial Training—the Undergraduate and the Graduate.

The Summer School Senate is composed of the following members: the resident Bishop the Chairman and Registrar of the Board of Examiners in both the Michigan and Detroit Conferences, the Dean and the Registrar of each of the two Schools—Graduate and Undergraduate. (The above hold for the quadrennium). Also one member from each Conference from the Undergraduate student body elected by them annually; and two members from each Conference from the Graduate student body, elected by them annually.

B—CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

Adopted in 1869, modified in 1875, and in continuous use since

I

The Conference shall meet at 8:30 o'clock a. m., and adjourn at 12 m., but may alter the time of meeting and adjourn at its discretion.

II

Duties of the President

1. The President shall take the chair precisely at the time to which the Conference stood adjourned. The first half hour of the session shall be devoted to religious services, and thereafter the journals of the preceding day shall be read and approved.

2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but, in case of an appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

3. He shall appoint all Committees, not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference, but any member may decline serving on more than one Committee at the same time.

III

Duties of the Secretary

The Secretary shall keep a journal of the proceedings of the Conference, and, when approved, shall record them in a book provided for that purpose. He shall take charge of the journal and other papers of the Conference, and preserve them with care; suffer no person to take a copy of any paper during the interval of Conference, except with the consent of the Conference; and shall forward the journal and papers to the next Annual Conference.

IV

Duties and Privileges of the Members

1. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the President, Secretary, or any member of the Conference requests it.

2. When a motion, resolution, or report presented is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before action or amendment.

3. No new motion or resolution shall be made before the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, viz: Indefinite postponement, laying on the table, reference to a Committee, postponement to any given time, or amendment.

4. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President, to call him to order when he departs from the question, uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems the speaker out of order or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

5. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President.

6. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject or more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

7. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration.

8. No member shall absent himself from the services of Conference without leave unless he is sick or unable to attend.

9. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time such question is put by the President, except by leave of Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

10. Every member who shall be within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, excuses him.

11. No motion shall be considered unless seconded.

12. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without debate.

13. No preacher shall bring any charge against any member of this Conference until he has first given him information of the same, either by letter or otherwise, ten days in advance, if practicable, so the accused may have an opportunity for defense.

14. When any brother intends to object to the passage of another's character, it shall be his duty to hand the name of the person against whom objections are to be made to the President of the Conference.

15. Two-thirds of the members present, and voting, may order the previous question on a pending motion.

16. Questions, not disciplinary, to be considered by the Conference shall be presented to the Conference and a future date fixed for their consideration. The vote on such questions to be by ballot.

[A motion to take an amendment to a resolution does not carry the resolution to the table.]

V

The candidates for admission on trial and into full membership, and for ordination, shall be presented to this Conference in Executive Session.

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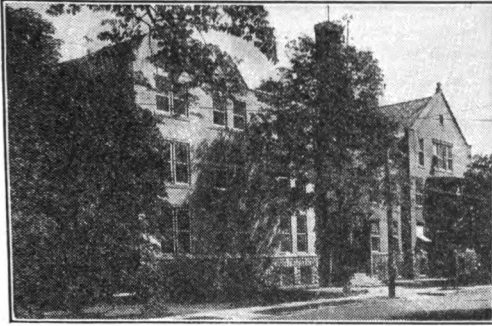

Trustees are elected by the Michigan Conference within whose territory the hospital is situated. Three trustees live in the Detroit Conference.

The hospital is on the approved list of the State Board. The student nurses are a very fine company of young women. When admitted they must be of good health, approved character, at least 18 years of age. By State Law they must have at least ten grades. All of our student nurses have twelve grades. They live in wholesome conditions in four Nurses' Homes.

The Operating, Sterilizing, Obstetrical, Laboratory and X-Ray Departments have the finest equipments. Five of the Staff are Fellows of the American College of Surgeons. The X-Ray equipment was installed under the direction of a former President of the National X-Ray Association. The Chief of staff is a recent President of the State Medical Association.

The Pathologist and Laboratory Director have had the finest training.

This hospital work is done by the Church as Christian Service. There are religious services every morning and Tuesday nights. Bronson Methodist Hospital began its work May 1, 1920. Up to June, 1934, when the financial year closes, there had been 35,284 patients from over 300 communities. During the past year there have been 3,147 patients. Nineteen student nurses were graduated May 12, 1934.

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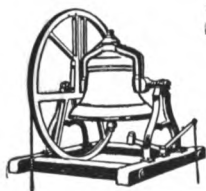
